Take a Paws - Buy Your 2019 Dog License

Once again it's time to purchase dog licenses for 2019!

Residents of Montgomery County may buy licenses between now and January 31 at the Moraine Administration Building, 4200 Dryden Road. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8am - 5pm. A license for a spayed or neutered dog costs \$20, an unaltered dog is \$24. Dogs ages 3 to 9 months are \$20 without regard to spaying/neutering. Ohio law requires all dogs over age 3 months to be licensed. The dog must reside in Montgomery County. Cash or checks are accepted. Make checks

payable to Montgomery County Dog License. (Sorry, no credit cards.)

License fees support Montgomery County Animal Resource Center operations and licensing a dog is a valuable tool in getting your pet home should they get lost. Dog licenses may also be purchased at Animal Resource Center (898-4457), 6790 Webster Street, in Dayton, or SICSA (294-6505), 2600 Wilmington Pike, in Kettering, or Humane Society of Greater Dayton (268-7387), 1661 Nicholas Road. Hours for these locations vary.



2018 Election Season Comes to End

Back in November, the City placed six Issues on the ballot. Five of those Issues provided for changes to the City's Charter while one issue, Issue 17, was to replace the City's temporary 0.5% income tax levy with a permanent 0.5% income tax levy. While all five of the proposed Charter Amendments passed; the income tax levy was defeated by only 152 votes. During the month of January, City Council decide whether or not to send the income tax issue back to the ballot on May 7.

Regardless of how your vote was cast on November 6, we would like to thank you for exercising your right to vote.

Snow Removal Guidelines

In order for the Street Division to properly and efficiently plow and clear roadways in the City, cooperation and assistance are needed from residents. Please follow these snow removal guidelines: Do not clean your driveway until your street has been plowed and salted by the Street Division. If you choose to clean your driveway prior to the Street Division plowing and salting your street, be sure to push the snow to the right of your driveway, so when plowed it doesn't block your driveway. If using a snow blower, we ask that you avoid blowing the snow back out into the street.

If a snowstorm consists of 2 inches or more, please park all vehicles in your driveway. This will greatly assist the Street Division in properly clearing and plowing all roadways and residential streets. Our goal is to make road conditions as safe as possible for travel through the City.

Priority List

- Main roads are first priority and the first to be cleaned.
- Secondary streets.
- Residential streets.
- Senior citizen driveways.

Please be patient and we will get to every road and driveway. Your cooperation is greatly needed and appreciated!

Christmas Tree Disposal

The Street Division will be collecting Christmas trees for disposal after the holidays. If you would like to dispose of your Christmas tree, please place it at the curb for pick up.



Senior Citizen / Handicap Driveway Plowing

During the winter season, the Street Division provides driveway plowing services for senior citizens and handicapped residents. This service is provided only when snow accumulation is 2 inches or more. Please note: this is the Street Division's last priority for snow-plowing. Requirements for receiving this service are:

- Must be 60 years of age or older.
- Must live alone.
- Exceptions: Handicapped persons who have a verified medical problem may qualify for this service.

Along with meeting all requirements, senior citizens must register in person each year at the Street Division in order to be eligible for this service. Our list of registrants is updated annually. Please note if you do not register annually, your driveway will not be plowed that particular year. If you have any questions, please contact the Street Division at 535-1040.

Turkey Check Point

On Friday, November 16, 2018, the Police Division hosted its first Turkey Checkpoint at the Miami Shores Baptist Church. While it mimicked an O.V.I. checkpoint, the event had a totally different purpose. Officers from the Community Outreach Team coordinated the event to target families that needed assistance for the holiday. Unsuspecting families approached a coned off area and were directed by officers and fire fighters. To their surprise they were given a turkey and wishes of a Happy Thanksgiving. The checkpoint lasted one hour and was a tremendous success. The event was only possible because of our friends at Fuyao and the Heren Foundation.



Rotary Host Annual Police & Fire Appreciation Lunch



The Rotary Club hosted the annual Appreciation Lunch for the Police & Fire Divisions at the PRC. Rotarians, businesses and residents donated entrées, side dishes and desserts to thank both divisions for their service to our community throughout the year. A total of 41 employees and family attended the event and the leftover food was taken back to all three police and fire stations so that shifts over the next 48 hours could enjoy the food. Special thanks to Council Member Shirley Whitt who supports the event every year.

Construction Woes

As many may be aware the City has experienced residential growth around Pinnacle and Vance Roads. The City is currently building the new Pinnacle Ridge subdivision that will feature 100 new homes built by Ryan Homes. In addition, Montgomery County Environmental Services is replacing the sanitary sewer line along Vance Road. These two projects have increased the amount of truck traffic in the area and has caused a fair amount of dirt to be tracked onto Vance and Pinnacle Roads. The City is working with the contractor of Pinnacle Ridge and the County to help alleviate this issue and have asked them to increase the number of times they sweep and scrape the roads on a daily basis. In addition the City has retained a street sweeping company that has larger street sweepers than the City to assist in keeping the streets clean.

FROSTBITE

A victim is often unaware of frostbite because frozen tissue is numb.



Signs & Symptoms

- Redness or pain in any skin area may be the first sign of frostbite.

Other signs include:

- a white or grayish-yellow skin area
- skin that feels unusually firm or waxy
- numbness

HYPOTHERMIA

Hypothermia often occurs at very cold temperatures, but can occur at cool temperatures (above 40°F), if a person is wet (from rain, sweat or cold water) and becomes chilled.



Signs & Symptoms

Adults:

- shivering
- exhaustion
- confusion
- fumbling hands
- memory loss
- slurred speech
- drowsiness

Infants:

- bright red, cold skin
- very low energy



If a person's temperature is below 95° get medical attention immediately.

CAN-TASTIC!

Each year we receive complaints about trash cans being left out in the open before and after trash day as well as trash not being properly placed in approved cans. Please refer to Moraine's Codified Ordinance 923.05 (MCO) which states the following.

Please remember to place all of your trash cans out of view before and after trash day either on the side, rear in your garage or shed. Also keep all trash in approved containers with a properly secured lid so it does not attract unwanted animals and bugs. The simple task of keeping your cans out of sight and sealed properly will have a positive effect on your home, neighborhood and the cities appearance.

City of Dayton Waste Collection

Just a reminder that all waste collection services will be provided by City of Dayton starting this month on Fridays with the exception of weeks that a holiday has occurred. Trash collection services will then be moved to Saturday. This service is free for residents in one and two-family dwellings. Bulk waste collection services will be provided on a bi-weekly scheduled basis. Scheduled bulk waste will be collected on the scheduled Friday. To schedule please call 333-4800.

What You Need to Know About Your New Trash Provider

Waste Collection

- Please have your bulk waste items, waste container, or recycle container out by 7 a.m. on your collection day.
- Please keep bulk, metal and tires separated. (They are picked up by separate trucks).
- Please DO NOT place any hot items into the waste or recycling containers (i.e., ashes from fireplaces).
- Please wrap, bag, or containerize all trash. DO NOT put loose waste out for collection.

Bulk Pick-Up

- Call 333-4800, no later than the Wednesday before your normal collection day, to schedule a bulk waste collection.
- Set items out by 7am the day of your scheduled bulk collection.
- Bundle, bag or containerize all small items. (Keep your neighborhood clean of loose debris).
- Tie brush, tree limbs, and carpet into bundles not heavier than 25 pounds, no larger than 4 feet in length, and no bigger than 18 inches in diameter.

The City of Dayton cannot collect: sheet rock (drywall), concrete, rocks, bricks, blocks, sand, gravel, paint, construction materials, or hazardous waste. (Examples of hazardous waste are paint, oil, gas containers, etc.).
