Eligible citizens are anyone who lives or works in Moraine or the surrounding area, who are 18 years old or older.


## **Boards and Commissions**

## WINTER STORMS

## What Can I Do?

## **Prepare Your Home**

Make your home winter ready. Buy needed supplies before the storm arrives. Have a plan in case you lose power or are unable to leave your home.

## Prepare Your Vehicle



Make your vehicle weather ready. Be sure to include a safety kit, cold weather gear, and all the necessities you may need to deal with the storm ahead.

## Monitor Your Forecast

Stay up to date with the latest forecast information as the storm approaches, monitor your favorite source for weather information.

## Have A Plan

Before weather threatens, be sure to have a communications plan, change travel plans, and prepare for the impacts to your routine.

## **Know The Terms**

Winter Storm Watch: There is potential of a significant winter weather event. Conditions are possible but not imminent.

Winter Weather Advisory: Winter weather is imminent and may cause inconveniences.

Winter Storm Warning: A significant winter storm is imminent and is a danger to life and property.

Blizzard Warning: A significant winter storm with strong winds, snow, and low visibility is imminent and is a danger to life and property.

Ice Storm Warning: Dangerous ice accumulations are imminent





## **Snow Removal Guidelines**

In order for the Street Division to properly and efficiently plow and clear roadways, cooperation and assistance is needed from residents. Please follow these snow removal guidelines:

- Do not clean your driveway until your street has been plowed and salted by the Street Division. If you choose to clean your driveway prior to the Street Division plowing and salting your street, be sure to push the snow to the right of your driveway so when we plow it doesn't block your driveway. If using a snow blower, we ask that you avoid blowing snow back into the street.
- If a snowstorm is 2 inches or more, please park all vehicles in your driveway. This will greatly assist the Street Division in properly clearing and plowing all roadways and residential streets. Our goal is to make road conditions as safe as possible for travel through the City.

# Senior Citizen and Handicap Driveway Plowing

During the winter season, the Street
Division provides driveway plowing
services for senior citizens and
handicapped residents of Moraine.
This service is provided only when
snow accumulation is 2 inches or
more. Please note: this is the Street
Division's last priority for snow plowing.
Requirements for receiving this service
are:

- Must be 60 years of age or older.
- Must live alone.
- Exceptions: Handicapped persons who have a verified medical problem may qualify for this service.

Along with meeting all requirements, senior citizens must register in person each year at the Street Division (4720 Vance Road) in order to be eligible for this service. Our list of registrants is updated yearly. Please note if you do not register yearly, your driveway will not be plowed that particular year. If you have any questions, please contact the Street Division at 535-1040.

## **Christmas Tree Disposal**

The Street Division will be collecting Christmas trees for disposal after the holidays. If you would like to dispose of your Christmas tree, please place it at the curb for pick up.



## PERMITS: IF IN DOUBT, CHECK IT OUT!



As any homeowner knows, there is always something that can be repaired or improved when you own a house. Before you begin any project, on your own or through a contractor, make sure you check with the City's Building and Zoning Department to determine whether or not a permit is necessary.

More home improvement projects require permits than you might think. "Permits are needed for more than just the obvious new buildings, additions, or interior remodeling," says Tony Wenzler, Building and Zoning Administrator. "Many people believe that if it's not a major project, then they don't need a permit--often that's just not the case.

Here is a list of common home improvement projects that require permits:

- Any heating, ventilation, air conditioning or electrical work, except normal maintenance items such as replacement switches, receptacles, light bulbs or fixtures.
- New construction, including additions or a major alteration to an existing building.
- Residential construction work including new houses, garages, sheds, pools (above-ground and in-ground), decks, porches and fences.
- Repair of damage to a home caused by fire, water, insects or vehicle collision.
- Water heaters, backflow devices, sump pumps, gas, sewer and some solar heating systems, if they are to be permanently attached to the house.

"The City requires all contractors performing work that requires a permit to be registered yearly with the City. These registrations and the required permits are a way to safeguard residents," Wenzler says. "It's a minimum standard set by the City to protect the health, safety and welfare of its citizens." While contractors should acquire the proper registration and permits, ultimately it is the homeowner's responsibility to make sure all the necessary permits have been obtained.

Wenzler suggests residents consider the following steps before any home improvement or repair:

- Don't pay the contractor before the work is completed and passes inspection.
- Ask to see any and all permits from the contractors before allowing work to begin.

# RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S HISTORY

THE GREAT MORAINE TROLLEY/AIRPLANE RACE

Pathe Sound News filmed a race challenge between an interurban trolley and a biplane in Moraine in 1930. The film was shown all across the country at movie theaters. For you younger readers, since there were no televisions in 1930, major news events were filmed and shown at movie theaters prior to the feature film.



The race began at Moraine Flying Field which was located just east of the Springboro Pike/Northlawn
Blvd. intersection and just north of Fuyao Glass America. The race ended near where the current Frisch's Restaurant is located.

The trolley was a Cincinnati and Lake Erie (C&LE line) whose maintenance building was located just west of today's Springboro Pike and Main Street intersection (see photo). The C&LE was a short lived electric high speed interurban streetcar/trolley railway that operated from 1930 to 1939 in depression era Ohio. C&LE ran twenty high speed "Red Devil" interurban passenger cars between Cincinnati, Dayton, Columbus & Toledo. Red Devils were power efficient, lighter (among the first to be constructed with aluminum), and passenger comfortable (with leather seats, toilet, luggage compartment) seating up to 44 people.


In the photo notice the Moraine Field hangar still has the painted words "Dayton

Municipal Airport" on it. That is because Moraine Field was Dayton's first municipal airport from 1926 to 1928.

The publicity stunt race was arranged by C&LE. The trolley had an edge as it took off while the plane had to taxi and get airborne. The interurban car ran at 97 mph and beat the

airplane.





## CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) POISONING

The health effects of CO depend upon the concentration in the air and the duration of the exposure.

Extended exposure to high concentrates will lead to unconsciousness, brain damage or death. However, for those of more vulnerable health, a lower concentration of exposure for longer periods of time may have similar effects as high concentration for brief periods.

The most common misdiagnosis of CO poisoning is a "flu-like" syndrome.

The following are key signs and symptoms of CO and other combustion by-product poisoning:

- Dizziness or headache
- Eye and upper respiratory irritation
- Wheezing or bronchial constriction
- Increased frequency of angina in persons with coronary heart disease
- Elevated blood carboxyhemoglobin levels
- Confusion
- Pain
- Persistent cough

Currently Accepted Medical Symptoms of Carbon Monoxide (CO) Poisoning:

220 PPM -Slight headaches, tiredness, dizziness, and nausea after 2-3 hours

400 PPM - Frontal headaches within 1-2 hours, life threatening after 3 hours

800 PPM - Dizziness, nausea, and convulsions with 45 minutes. Unconsciousness within 2 hours. Death within 2-3 hours

1600 PPM - Headache, dizziness, and nausea within 20 minutes. Death within 1 hour.

6400 PPM - Headache, dizziness, and nausea within 1-2 minutes. Death within 10-15 minutes.

ALL EFFECTS CAN VARY SIGNIFICANTLY BASED UPON AGE, SEX, WEIGHT, AND OVERALL STATE OF HEALTH.

If CO is measured within the living or working space of a building, the following diagnostic approach may aid in the discovery of its generation activity and perhaps its affect on the inhabitants. The discovery begins with questions.

- When did the symptoms or complaints begin:
- Does this symptom or complaint exist all the time or does it come and go?
- Is the symptom associated with a particular location or time of day?
- Is the symptom season in nature?
- Does the problem seem to improve, your health improve after you leave a specific place?
- Are the symptoms associated with a change of workplace or living locations?
- Anyone else in the house or building have similar symptoms or complaints?
- Is the symptom associated with the use of any heating or cooking equipment?
- Do you have an attached garage? Do you warm your car up inside with door open?
- Are you a smoker or around smokers during the times of your discomfort?
- Is charcoal being burned indoors in a grill, fireplace, or other cooking device?
- Is there an odor present when heating, cooking, or other combustion appliance in use?
- What types of combustion equipment are in use?
- When was the last time the combustion equipment serviced?
- Does any of the combustion equipment seem to be in disrepair?

## Take a Paws - Buy Your 2020 Dog License

Once again it's time to purchase dog licenses for 2020!

Residents of Montgomery County may buy licenses between December 2 - January 31 at the Moraine Administration Building, 4200 Dryden Road. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8am - 5pm. A license for a spayed or neutered dog costs \$20, an unaltered dog is \$24. Dogs ages 3 to 9 months are \$20 without regard to spaying/neutering. Ohio law requires all dogs over age 3 months who reside in Montgomery County to be licensed. Cash or checks are accepted. Make checks payable to Montgomery County Dog License. (Sorry, no credit cards.)

License fees support Montgomery County Animal Resource Center operations and licensing a dog is a valuable tool in getting your pet home should they get lost.
