Take a Paws - Buy Your 2022 Dog License

Once again it's time to purchase dog licenses for 2022!

Residents of Montgomery County may buy licenses between December 1 - January 31 at the Moraine Administration Building, 4200 Dryden Road. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8am - 4:30pm. A license for a spayed or neutered dog costs \$20, an unaltered dog is \$24. Dogs ages 3 to 9 months are \$20 without regard to spaying/neutering. Ohio



law requires all dogs over age 3 months who reside in Montgomery County to be licensed. The City accepts **cash only - exact change**.

License fees support Montgomery County Animal Resource Center operations and licensing a dog is a valuable tool in getting your pet home should they get lost.

INCOME TAX REMINDER

Estimated payments are required if tax liability will exceed \$200.00. Quarterly estimated tax payments are due **April 15**, **June 15**, **September 15**, **and January 15** of each year.

A 15% penalty for underpaid/unpaid estimated tax may apply. You can make your fourth quarter estimated payment in the office, by mail, a credit card payment over the phone, or leave in the drop box located in the lobby.

You can also now make your estimated tax payments online at http://www.mitstaxonline.com/moraine. To make an estimated payment online, you must have the Declaration of Estimated Tax already in our tax system.

The City of Moraine is served by several Boards and Commissions, each comprised of dedicated Moraine residents who volunteer their time and talents to help improve the quality of their government. Christmas Tree Disposal



The Street Division will be collecting Christmas trees for disposal after the holidays. If you would like to dispose of your Christmas tree, please place it at the curb for pick-up.

All lights, ornaments, plastic coverings/wraps and metals must be removed from the tree prior to pick up. Items left on trees can injure employees or seriously damage the tree shredding equipment, leaving it inoperable.

Senior Citizen / Handicap Driveway Plowing

During the winter season, the Street Division provides driveway plowing services for senior citizens and handicapped residents only when snow accumulation is 2 inches or more. Please note: this is the Street Division's last priority for snow-plowing. Requirements for receiving this service are:

- Must be 60 years of age or older.
- Must live alone.
- Exceptions: Handicapped persons who have a verified medical problem may qualify for this service.

Along with meeting all requirements, senior citizens must register in person each year at the Street Division (4720 Vance Road) in order to be eligible for this service. Our list of registrants is updated yearly. Please note if you do not register yearly, your driveway will not be plowed that particular year. If you have any questions, please contact the Street Division at 937-535-1040.



Snow Removal Guidelines

In order for the Street Division to properly and efficiently plow and clear roadways, cooperation and assistance is needed from residents. Please follow these snow removal guidelines:

- Do not clean your driveway until your street has been plowed and salted. If you choose to clean your driveway prior to plowing and salting of your street, be sure to push the snow to the right of your driveway so when we plow it doesn't block your driveway. If using a snow blower, we ask that you avoid blowing snow back into the street.
- If a snowstorm consists of 2 inches or more, please park all vehicles in your driveway. This will greatly assist the Street Division in properly clearing and plowing all roadways and residential streets. Our goal is to make road conditions as safe as possible for travel throughout the City.

RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S HISTORY

MORAINE "DREAMLAND" - THE WORLD'S FIRST MODEL INDUSTRIAL COMMUNITY - PART 2

In last month's Moraine Messenger history article, the February 11, 1916 Dayton Herald Newspaper headline proclaimed, "Worlds Model Community to be Established in Dayton - A Plan for the Next Generation."

The ultimate goal - the most beautiful, healthful and wonderful industrial home community ever conceived.

Today, let's look ahead ten years later to see what has been developed by The Moraine Development Corporation led by Adam Schantz. The Dayton Daily News May 2, 1926 headline above the rare photo of the Miami & Erie Canal in Moraine states the Moraine Development Corporation will develop homes and industry on a tract of this land including the canal to develop their "Dream City."

The road in the photo is Dryden Road looking north with the Miami and Erie Canal just to the right (east) of it. Imagine just 20 years earlier canal flatboats trafficked the canal carrying people and goods being pulled by mule or ox. Since the disastrous Great Dayton Flood of 1913 brought an end to the canal, you can see in the photo that the water is gone and filled in with dirt.

To give the photo modern day perspective, the flat farmland to the left is where today's Heidelberg Distributing Company building is located. On the right of the canal is where today's R & J Trucking is located.



The large building on the far right located on Springboro Pike is

Frigidaire which made refrigerators. The large factory building has a fabled history as it was previously occupied by both the Wright Airplane Company which built America's first World War I bomber the De Havilland DH-4 and by Delco Light that built portable generators for farms. The Frigidaire complex continued to grow in size and expanded north along Springboro Pike employing more factory workers.

From 1929 through the early 1930's, the Moraine Development Corporation had sales campaigns to promote the development of both water recreation and the sales of lots in Miami Shores and also on the east side of the river to bring in residents to build and live in year round dwellings or just in seasonal summer cottages. During the 1930's and 1940's Miami Shores showed substantial development of homes.

As for housing developments on the east side of the river, many houses were built east of Frigidaire between Springboro Pike and the Cincinnati-Dayton Pike (South Dixie Drive). Looking at a 1938 aerial map I counted seven houses built on Old Sellars Road next to today's Road Dogs Gasoline & Convenience Store at the corner of Main Street and Dryden Road. However, looking at the 1949 aerial map more progress was made as many more homes were added to the plat along Lakehurst Court, Telhurst Court and other streets and several small factories lined the east side of Dryden Road.

Although the great vision to develop this world class industrial community still existed, progress and development showed slow but consistent growth over the next two decades of existence.

City of Moraine - A Purple Heart City!

Moraine City Council, at its October 28 meeting, declared Moraine a Purple Heart City, showing gratitude for the military and veterans. Mayor Elaine Allison delivered an official proclamation to recognize the designation.

The Purple Heart Medal is the oldest military honor, established in August 1782 by George Washington as the commander-in-chief of the Continental Army. The medal

is awarded in the name of the President to those wounded or killed while serving with the United States Armed Forces. An estimated 1.7 million veterans since World War I have received the honor.





"Thousands of veterans Citywide have served our country and sacrificed so much on our behalf, and today's declaration is in their honor," said Mayor Elaine Allison. "I also want to commend the men and woman of The Military Order of the Purple Heart for their local charitable work and mission protecting all those who have received the commendation."

Moraine will post roadside Purple Heart City signs near the entrances of the City. Additionally, the City will designate a Wounded Warrior parking spot at our Municipal Building, PRC and GCC.

Order Memorial Bricks by January 15

Our All-Veterans memorial was constructed in 2002. It has a large monument with each branch of the military, as well as 563 bricks to remember our veterans.

Deadline for the Memorial Day order is January 15; bricks will be installed in early May and dedicated during the Memorial Day Ceremony. Forms may be downloaded from the City's website at ci.moraine. oh.us/memorial-bricks/.



 - **3.** Please **DO NOT** place any hot items into the waste or recycling containers (i.e., ashes from fireplaces).
 - **4.** Please wrap, bag, and containerize all trash. **DO NOT** put loose waste out for collection.

To inquire about waste services, please call (937) 333-4800, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

- Normal collection is Friday unless a holiday falls during that week. For changes to the collection schedule, please refer to the calendar.
- Moraine recyclables will be collected on the same day as the trash. Please **DO NOT** put recyclables in plastic bags. Please make sure your waste and recycling containers are clearly labeled.
- All bulk waste collections must be scheduled in advance and will be collected every other week. Please call no later than the Wednesday before your normal collection day to schedule.

As a reminder

■ All garbage and residential waste for collection shall be placed in a container.

BULK WASTE DISPOSAL INFORMATION AND GUIDELINES-


Call (937) 333-4800, no later than the Wednesday before your normal collection day, to schedule a bulk waste collection.

- Bulk waste items are to be set out after 3:00 p.m. of the day before the scheduled pick-up. City crews begin pick-ups at 6:30 a.m.
- You must separate your metal items (stoves refrigerators, etc.) and tires from other bulk items. Remember to remove refrigerator doors.
- All loose and small items must be securely contained, bundled or bagged for easy pickup.
- We do not pick up sheet rock (drywall), concrete, rocks, brick blocks, sand, gravel, paint, construction materials or hazardous waste.
- Yard waste (brush, hedges, tree limbs, etc.) must be tied diameter and must be less than 25 pounds.




