CITY CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

In continuing with the City's commitment to improving roadways and maintaining infrastructure, there are many great improvements coming our way in 2021! Updated information regarding construction zones will be posted on the City's social media pages.

The final surface paving of all roadways within the Pinnacle Ridge subdivision will be completed this Spring.

The City will be replacing curb and curb ramps on S. Dixie Drive. Curb ramps will also be installed in West Moraine Plat. All work is expected to be complete by Fall 2021. Concrete curb and sidewalk repairs in the City are not assessed to the property owners.

The City will be resurfacing Hemple Road, Pinnacle Road (from Vance Road to Main Street) and Soldiers Home West Carrollton Road, north of Shank Road). Additional permanent pavement patching will be completed in the western portion of the City, as budget allows. Vance Road will be resurfaced from Main Street to the City's northern corporation limit. This project is partially funded by a federal grant through the Ohio Department of Transportation and Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission. This project is expected to be completed by October 2021.

Roadway resurfacing, curb replacement and curb ramp installation will be completed in Haverstick South. Construction is expected to begin this Spring and will be completed by October 2021. This project is partially funded by a Community Development Block Grant through Montgomery County. The streets included are listed below.

DON'T FORGET TO FILE

All residents who live in the City for the entire year or partial year are required to file a City income tax return with the Tax

Office on an annual basis, whether or not tax is due. If you are retired or do not have taxable income, you may file a Declaration of Exemption Return for the year or may qualify to file a permanent exemption.

If you file your return after the due date, you must attach a copy of your Federal extension with your City Income Tax Return. The Federal extension form is only extending your filing deadline and not for payment of tax due.

Penalty and interest will be charged for unpaid tax balances of \$25 a month with a late filing penalty not to exceed \$150, late pay penalty (15%) and late pay interest (5%) for late/non-filed tax returns.

As a convenience, we accept MasterCard and Visa for payments at the Finance Department's front desk and over the phone.

Walk-in office hours will be available for filing assistance Monday-Friday from 8:30am - 4:30pm.

New Online Filing / Tax Preparation Tool

On February 1, 2021, the City's Income Tax Office unveils a new online tax filing and payment website. This new website provides a user-friendly approach where taxpayers can input their tax information and then produce a calculated and final return.

At the time of the electronic filing, the taxpayer will be able to upload their supporting tax documents making a much more enjoyable and faster filing experience.

Taxpayers may:

- Access their accounts online to check estimated tax payments and carryover credits
- Make payments towards estimated quarterly taxes and payment plans
- Pay online at the same time of their filing with a credit card for a convenience fee charged by the credit card processor.

RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S HISTORY

WHAT WAS AN ELECTRIC MULE?

The Miami & Erie Canal ran North-South through Moraine where Dryden Road and Arbor Blvd. is today. Mules and horses pulled the canal boats along a tow path that paralleled the canal. The canal was vital carrying supplies, goods, food and people across southwest Ohio from 1845 until the end of the 1800s.

Due to the convenience of faster and larger trains the use of the canal waned. A last ditch effort to "speed up" the delivery of goods using the canal was tried. In an effort to modernize freight hauling technology, Baldwin Locomotive was commissioned by the Miami & Erie Transportation Company to build a number of "Electric Mules" or electric trolleys to tow canal boats between Dayton and Cincinnati.

A track was laid over the tow path. By 1905, it ran from Dayton, through Moraine, to the south of Miamisburg. Support poles were erected to provide electricity for the trolleys. It was soon learned the clay banks could not support the trolleys, due to the wake created from the speed of the locomotive. After delivering only one Electric Mule, the balance of the order with Baldwin was cancelled. In addition, the spaces between the railroad ties were not graded and violated the contractor's specifications. These spaces should provide a smooth towpath, but the ties created a trip hazard for mules that were still operating on the route.

As history shows, the experiment with the Electric Mules failed miserably and did not help revive traffic on the Miami & Erie Canal. The canal was abandoned for commercial use due to damage caused by the historic 1913 flood. Today, a Moraine Historical Marker is located at the corner of Dryden Road and East River Road which marks the location where Lock 22 was located on the canal.

Testing Hydrants

SPRING CLEANING VITAL FOR FIRE SAFETY

Spring cleaning is an annual ritual for many people. Just as the change of season ushers in a new beginning for nature, spring cleaning signifies a fresh start for us after the long winter months.

Spring cleaning can take on another meaning. It's the ideal time to plan a safety clean up day. In order to keep your family and property safe, take the time to check your home and yard for dangerous materials and unsafe conditions.

You will want to check each room in your house including the attic, basement, garage, yard, and storage shed. Plan to do several different things to start your safety clean up day:

- Choose nontoxic products for your cleaning.
- Test all your smoke detectors to ensure they are working. Change the batteries at least twice a year.
- Check fire extinguishers for proper type and placement.
- Make sure all doors and windows open easily for fast escapes.
- Make sure your street numbers are posted properly and are visible.
- Make sure you have a working flashlight and batterypowered radio for the approaching storm season.
- Check for good clearances between heating appliances and combustibles.

- Develop and practice a family fire escape plan in case of emergency.
- Consider installing carbon monoxide alarms in your home.
- Keep traffic areas free of clutter, toys and rugs in order to avoid tripping.
- Discard toxic and flammable materials you no longer need.
- Check the play area for sharp objects, hazardous materials, and tripping hazards.
- Children must not be allowed to ride as passengers on lawn mowers or to be towed behind mowers.
- Carry loads you can see over.
- Five gallon buckets are often used while cleaning and present a serious drowning danger to young children. Never leave a bucket or any standing water unattended and store buckets empty and upsidedown.
- Follow safety recommendations when using harsh products, such as wearing gloves and masks.
- If you need to climb, use a stepladder or extension ladder. When using a ladder, stand at or below the highest safe standing level. For a stepladder, the safe standing level is the second rung from the top, and for an extension ladder, it's the fourth rung from the top. Before using, make sure the rungs are dry.



A healthy and diverse ecosystem is important for clean air and water, soil stability and provides critical food and shelter for wildlife.

Whether adding a few native plants to your landscape or substituting them in for exotic species, there are many benefits to going native! The interest in native gardening is increasing, so check with your local nursery to determine what's available and which plants are best suited to your landscape needs.

Why plant native species?

- Good for wildlife, such as birds and butterflies
- Costs less and saves time due to lower maintenance requirements
- Saves water because natives are best suited for an Ohio climate
- No need for fertilizers or pesticides
- Native plants control erosion and filter storm water

Cardon Plots

Do you love to garden, but don't have the space at home to do so? The City has 78 garden plots located on Vance Road at the end of Dorf Drive (near the entrance to German Village). Each garden plot is $20' \times 90$,' and very affordable to reserve for the season. Registration for the garden plots takes place at the PRC, and is broken down into two phases:

Phase I: Opens March 1, 2021, and is for all 2020 plot users who cleared their garden plot at the conclusion of the growing year with no issues.

Phase II: Opens March 15, 2021, and is for all new gardeners.



We only guarantee the same garden plots that were used in 2020 in Phase I, not any new garden plots. For example, if you had garden plots 1 and 2, then you may reserve those same garden plots during Phase I only. If you wish to change the garden plot(s), you have to wait until Phase II to do so.

Garden plots cost \$15 for Moraine residents and \$20 for non-residents, annually. You must pay the fee at the point of registration to confirm your garden plot selection. You must plant your garden plot by May 31, 2021, or it will be reclaimed by the City. It is important to control weeds during the Summer and Fall seasons, otherwise you jeopardize losing your garden plot if weeds are overgrown.

All garden plots must be cleared by November 1, 2021 at the latest. Any gardener who does not clear their garden plot of stakes and any others items that could damage a tractor during plowing, will lose their gardening privileges for the 2022 season. Garden plots will be available for use starting early April, weather dependent. If you have any questions or need more information regarding our garden plots, please call the PRC at 937-535-1060.



Supplies for this raindrop art project:

- Crayons

- Duct Tape
- Wooden Dowel
- Clear Tape
- Wax Paper
- Hair Dryer
- String
- 1. Unwrap 4–6 crayons, then use crayon sharpener to create shavings.
- 2. Lay piece of wax paper on protected surface. Evenly sprinkle shavings onto wax paper.
- 3. Place slightly larger piece of wax paper overtop. Seal edges with duct tape.
