RESIDENTIAL LARGE TRASH PICK-UP

Listed below are the guidelines for large trash pickup along with the dates the Street Division will be in your neighborhood. Please note: several trucks from the Street Division will pick-up the items separately. The Street Division is asking residents to assist in separating their unwanted items. This service is not provided to businesses in the City.

Items Not Acceptable:

55 gallon drums, household garbage, asbestos material, swimming pool chemicals, pesticides, herbicides, fertilizers, photographic chemicals, propane tanks, fuel, oil, gas or oxygen tanks, compressed cylinders

Acceptable Items and Guidelines:

- Tree trimmings and/or brush must be no longer than 8 feet in length. We ask that residents stack all brush at the curb neatly with the butt end facing the street so that it may be easily loaded into the chipper. Please keep all brush separate from all other disposal items.
- Paint, batteries, motor oil, metals and appliances containing freon. Please keep all these disposal items separate.
- Tires should also be kept separate from all other disposal items. Only a total of eight truck and car tires will be accepted for disposal. Tractor tires will not be accepted.

Please place all unwanted items at the curb on the weekend prior to the scheduled pick-up date. All large trash pick-up items must be placed next to the curb by Monday at 7am.

Fire Hydrant Testing

The Fire Division will be performing the semi-annual test of the City's hydrants starting April 1st and continuing throughout the month.

The hydrants are checked twice a year to ensure they are working properly. These tests enable the Fire Division to be better prepared to protect and serve the public.


During these tests, the water may turn brown. Residents should avoid doing laundry and drinking water from the tap until the discoloration clears.



2021 CITY INCOME TAX DUE APRIL 18, 2022

All residents who live in the City for the entire year or partial year are required to file a City Income Tax Return with the Tax Office on an annual basis, whether or not tax is due.

If you are retired or do not have taxable income; you may file a Declaration of Exemption Return for the year or may qualify to file a permanent exemption.



Penalty and interest will be charged for unpaid tax balances of \$25 a month with a late filing penalty not to exceed \$150, late pay penalty (15%) and late pay interest (5%) for late/unfiled tax returns.

As a convenience, we accept MasterCard and Visa for payments at the Finance Department's Office and over the phone.

Walk-in office hours will be available for filing assistance Monday-Friday from 8:30am - 4:30pm.

If you can't make it during business hours, we have a drop box located in the Municipal Building lobby where you can leave copies of your documents to file in a sealed envelope (please don't leave original documents if you need them). We also now have a new online filing system that can be used if you have filed with us previously www. mitstaxonline.com/moraine. Please be sure to include all required documents such as: W-2s, W-2G, Schedule C/E, 1099-MISC, 1099-NEC and your Federal 1040, etc.

Parking Ordinance Changes

To address safety and property damage concerns, the City has updated its onstreet parking ordinances to reflect the following changes effective March 13th, 2022.



Trailers that are unattached

from their tow vehicle will no longer be permitted to be parked on the roadway at any time. This includes campers, boat trailers, flatbed trailers, car haulers, box trailers, cargo trailers and any other trailer designed to carry passengers or property. Unattached trailers are subject to towing in addition to parking citations.

Additionally, all vehicles that remain parked, standing or abandoned upon any street for a continuous 48 hour period are hereby designated as obstructions to traffic and may be removed from the right-of-way. Vehicles parked on the roadway for longer than 48 continuous hours are subject to towing in addition to parking citations.

These updated ordinances involve all roadways in the City including highways, through roadways, residential streets, cul-de-sacs, dead end streets, etc.

The City realizes this will impact some of our residents that have used the roadway to temporarily park trailers and vehicles. Please make plans now to remove your long-term parked vehicles and trailers from the roadway.

RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S

MORAINE'S "DEAD MAN'S CROSSING"

HISTORY

Sounds like something paranormal or a cheap "B" horror movie title but in reality back in the 1920's this was a small stretch of road and a railroad crossing in Moraine that was scary because quite often it led to fatal results. The road was the Great American Turnpike in Moraine, also called Dixie Highway or Cincinnati Pike. This is the section of the road that goes west from today's Frisch's Restaurant and Waffle House past Dryden Road onward past the I-75 northbound and southbound entrance ramps and on into West Carrollton (Central Avenue).


One hundred years ago, the two lane Dixie Highway crossed the Big Four Railroad tracks at ground level just east of Dryden Road. No overpass existed. Visibility was very poor due to the curve and a couple houses preventing drivers from seeing the fast approaching trains. A June 1926 Dayton Daily News article states that due to frequent deadly accidents "state and county officials will build a bridge over the tracks as buildings near the tracks have obstructed the view of trains that come at a sharp angle." Elevation of the road would begin 500 feet on either side of the tracks and give trains a 30 foot clearance.

Instead of building a bridge overpass, engineers first considered building the roadway under the railroad tracks but due to the close proximity of the interurban traction (trolley) line viaduct and the nearby Miami and Erie Canal, it was deemed inadvisable.

Several houses/buildings would be removed and the road would

"Dead Man's Crossing" or officially Stop 9 Crossing, according to the Dayton Automobile Club, stated that more fatalities occurred at this crossing than any other crossing in the city or Montgomery County due to the heavy volume of traffic on Dixie Highway. Estimates to build the new overpass would cost \$200,000 (over \$3 million dollars today).

The overpass was completed and many lives were saved due to the safety of the overpass.

A quick historical note: some of the original ground level Great Miami Turnpike/Dixie Highway still exist today. The original two lane brick road is just north of the railroad tracks (see photo) about an inch underground if you were to dig the surface dirt and weeds away. It is solid and 16 feet 11 inches wide.



CITY CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

2022 is expected to be a big year for roadway improvements in Moraine! Please be cautious while driving through construction zones and obey all signs, cones, barricades, and the directions of the construction workers while in these zones.

Updated information regarding construction zones will be posted on the City's social media pages.

Concrete Program

The City will be replacing curb and curb ramps in German Village. All work is expected to be complete by Fall 2022. Concrete curb and sidewalk repairs in Moraine are not assessed to the property owners.

Paving Program

The City will be resurfacing Charlotte Mill Drive, Loveland Court, Pinnacle Park Drive, Parallel Road, Paris Drive, Sellars Road, Angus Lane, and Herford Trail. A large repair will also be made on the north end of Arbor Blvd, near Carillon Blvd. All work is expected to be complete by Fall 2022.

Concrete Pavement Program

Concrete pavement will be replaced at the southern intersection of Dryden Road and East River Road. New concrete pavement will be installed on eastbound Stroop Road at South Dixie Drive and on westbound Northlawn Avenue at Dryden Road. All work is expected to be complete by Fall 2022.

Dryden Road North Water Main Replacement

The water main along Dryden Road, north of the East River Road traffic signal, will be replaced by Montgomery County Environmental Services prior to the resurfacing work.

Dryden Road North Resurfacing

Dryden Road will be resurfaced from Kreitzer Road to the City's north Corporation limit. Curb repair, sidewalk and curb ramp installation, and a traffic signal replacement at Dryden Road and East River Road are also included in this project. This project is partially funded by a federal grant through the Ohio Department of Transportation and MVRPC. This project is also partially funded by an Ohio Public Works Commission Grant. All work is expected to be completed by October 2022.

Cobblegate Drive Improvements

Roadway resurfacing, curb replacement, and curb ramp installation will be completed on Cobblegate Drive. Construction is expected to begin this Spring and will be completed by October 2022. This project is partially funded by a Community Development Block Grant through Montgomery County.

SEVERE WEATHER!

This preparedness guide explains weather hazards and suggests life-saving actions you can take. With this information, you can develop a plan, and be ready to act when threatening weather



approaches. Remember, your safety is up to you!

What you can do before severe weather strikes.

- Develop a plan for you and your family at home, and when outdoors.
- Identify a safe place to take shelter.
- Have frequent drills.
- Have a NOAA weather radio with warning alarm tone and battery back-up to receive warnings.
- Listen to the radio and television for weather information.

Tornadoes

Although tornadoes occur in many parts of the world, they are found most frequently in the United States. In an average year, 1,200 tornadoes cause 70 fatalities and 1,500 injuries nationwide.

Tornado safety rules

- In a home or building, move to a predesignated shelter, such as a basement.
- If an underground shelter is not available, move to a small interior room or hallway on the lowest floor and get under a sturdy piece of furniture.
- Stay away from windows.
- Get out of automobiles. Do not try to outrun a tornado in your car.
- If caught outside or in a vehicle, lie flat in a nearby ditch or depression and cover your head with your hands.
- Be aware of flying debris. Flying debris from tornadoes causes most fatalities and injuries.

 Mobile homes, even if tied down, offer little protection from tornadoes. Leave and get to the nearest sturdy building.

Flash floods

Flash floods are the #1 cause of deaths associated with thunderstorms with more than 140 fatalities each year. Most flash floods fatalities occur at night and most victims are people who become trapped in automobiles. Six inches of fast-moving water can knock you off your feet; a depth of two feet will cause most vehicles to float.

- Avoid walking, swimming, or driving in floodwaters.
- Stay away from high water, storm drains, ditches, ravines, or culverts.
- If you come up on floodwaters, stop, turn around, and go another way.
- Don't let children play near storm drains.

Siren testing

The Fire Division tests the tornado sirens on the first Monday of each month at noon, weather permitting. These test are to ensure the sirens are operating properly. The sirens are not designed to be heard "Citywide" while indoors. The sirens are primarily to warn people who are outdoors, away from television and radios.

Storm Water Management

Anything that enters a storm sewer system is discharged untreated into the water bodies we use for swimming, fishing and providing drinking water. Polluted storm water runoff is a threat to clean water.


Roofs, parking lots, streets and lawns prevent storm water from soaking into the ground. As storm water flows over these areas, it can dissolve, pick up and transport things such as automotive waste, lawn chemicals, paints and eroded soil. When these pollutants make their way into streams and rivers, they can destroy fish, wildlife and aquatic life habitats. This contamination can lessen aesthetic value and threaten public health.

WHAT TO DO

- Keep chemicals, yard waste and other material out of storm drains.
- Choose plants that are native to the area which don't require a lot of water and are resistant to insects and disease.
- Use a rain barrel or plant a rain garden.
- Control soil erosion plant ground cover and stabilize erosion-prone areas.
- Control insects naturally Provide habitat for birds, bats and toads and introduce praying mantises, lacewings, ladybugs and other pesteaters to your garden.
- Use a commercial car wash or wash your car on a grassy area so the ground can filter the water.
- Check your car and other machinery for leaks and spills. Make repairs as soon as possible.

WHAT NOT TO DO

- Over water use trickle irrigation or soaker hoses instead of sprinklers.
- Over apply follow pesticide and fertilizer directions carefully for the best results.
- Over buy only purchase what you need and follow the directions for proper storage and disposal.
- Never allow roof gutters to drain directly to the street or storm sewer.



- Mow too low set the mower blades to cut the grass two or three inches high. Mow often and leave the clippings to retain moisture and provide nutrients to the soil.
- Never put used oil and other fluids down the storm drain. Recycle oil and fluids at a service or recycling center.
- Never rinse oil or chemical spills into the storm drain. Clean up spilled fluids with an absorbent material like kitty litter or sand.
