Progress Through Unity

Moraine Income Tax Due July 15, 2020

The City's income tax filing due date has been extended to July 15, 2020. This extension includes individual taxpayers and businesses. The 2019 City Income Tax Returns and the 1st quarter estimated payments for 2020 need to be filed and paid by July 15, 2020 to avoid penalties and interest.

All residents who have lived in the City for the entire year or partial year are required to file a City income tax return with the Tax Division on an annual basis, whether or not tax is due. If you are retired or do not have taxable income, you may file a Declaration of Exemption Return for the year or may qualify to file a permanent exemption.

If you file your return after the due date, you must attach a copy of your Federal extension with your City Income Tax Return. The Federal extension form is only extending your filing deadline and not for payment of tax due. A late filing penalty of \$25 per month will be assessed not to exceed \$150. A late payment penalty of 15% and late payment interest of 7% for late or non-filed tax returns also applies.

CITY OF DAYTON WASTE AND RECYCLING COLLECTION

Waste Collection Services

All existing trash and recycle containers, provided by Republic Services, have been purchased by the City of Dayton for continued use, free of charge to Moraine residents. Residents have the option to use their own trash containers or to lease a 96-gallon roll-out waste container from the City of Dayton for \$24 per year. The leased containers will be billed annually in January of each calendar year.

All waste collection services will be provided on Friday with the exception of weeks that a holiday has occurred. Trash collection services will then be moved to Saturday; please see the collection calendar for all 2020 scheduled dates. Bulk waste collection services will be provided on a bi-weekly scheduled basis. Scheduled bulk waste will be collected on the scheduled Friday. To schedule, please call 937-333-4800.

For any questions related to waste collection services, please contact Dayton's Call Center at 937-333-4800 between 8am and 5pm, Monday - Friday.

Bulk Waste Disposal Information and Guidelines

1. Call 937-333-4800, no later than the Wednesday before your normal collection day, to schedule a bulk waste collection.
2. Set items out by 7am the day of your scheduled bulk collection.
3. Bundle, bag or containerize all small items. (Keep your neighborhood clean of loose debris.)
4. Tie brush, tree limbs, and carpet into bundles not heavier than 25 pounds, no larger than 4 feet in length, and no bigger than 18 inches in diameter.
5. The City of Dayton cannot collect: sheet rock (drywall), concrete, rocks, bricks, blocks, sand, gravel, paint, construction materials, or hazardous waste. (Examples of hazardous waste are paint, oil, gas containers, etc.)

To inquire about waste services, please call (937) 333-4800, between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday thru Friday.

■ Normal collection is Friday unless a holiday falls during that week. For changes to the collection schedule, please refer to the calendar.

■ Moraine recyclables will be collected on the same day as the trash. Please DO NOT put recyclables in plastic bags. Please make sure your waste and recycling containers are clearly labeled.

■ All bulk waste collections must be scheduled in advance and will be collected every other week. Please call no later than the Wednesday before your normal collection day to schedule.

Do I have to pay for a waste container?

■ No. You can continue to use your current waste container; however it should be clearly labeled as a waste container. Should a replacement waste container be needed, a 96 gallon City of Dayton waste container can be provided upon request by calling the call center at 333-4800. The leased rate for the waste container is \$24 annually for Moraine residents; invoiced in January.

Do I have to pay for a recycling container?

■ No. You can continue to use your current recycling container; however it should be clearly labeled as a recycle container. Should a replacement recycle container be needed, a 96 gallon City of Dayton recycle container will be provided, free of charge, to Moraine residents by calling 333-4800.

As a reminder

■ All garbage and residential waste for collection shall be placed in a container.

City Construction Update

“Orange Barrel Season” is in full swing! Please drive cautiously and respect all construction zones. These zones are set up to protect the workers and drivers! Check the City’s website and/or social media posts for updates.

2020 Concrete Program

The City’s concrete curb replacement program is now complete! Structurally deteriorated curb was replaced in the West Moraine Plat, Riverview Plat, and on North Moraine Drive.

2020 Paving Program

The City’s annual residential paving program is now underway. As a part of this project, the final surface layer of asphalt will also be paved in both sections of the new Pinnacle Ridge subdivision. This work is scheduled to be completed by Fall 2020.

Streets included in this scheduled work are: Northlawn Avenue, Southlawn Avenue, Holman Street, Gladstone Street, Cloverlawn Avenue, Cadillac Street, Telhurst Court, Portage Road, Old Sellars Road, Lakehurst Street, Hoylake Court, North Moraine Drive.

Wright Landing

The City is proud to be moving on to another great addition to our residential market. Wright Landing is a new subdivision, located off of Vance Road. This new plat is the next step in the City’s partnership with Ryan Homes to bring fresh, new housing to Moraine. Site work and road construction are currently underway and expected to be completed by the Fall 2020. We appreciate your patience as we complete this project to bring more housing to Moraine!

Dryden Road Resurfacing

The City is very excited to be using federal grant dollars to help fund the resurfacing of Dryden Road, from south of Main Street to Kreitzer Road. This project is expected to be completed by the Fall 2020. Traffic will be maintained in both directions at all times. Please expect minor delays during working hours.

W. Dorothy Lane Improvements

Concrete panel repairs on W. Dorothy Lane are now complete. The completed repair work was intended only to replace the most severely deteriorated concrete panels between Springboro Pike and Encrete Lane. Further repair work will be scheduled in upcoming years. This project was funded by an Ohio Public Works Commission Grant.

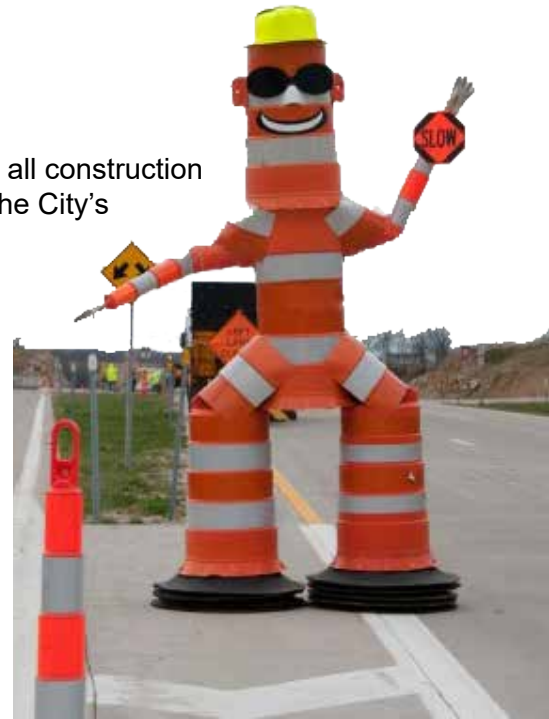
Deer Meadow Parking Lot Expansion

The City will be adding additional parking at Deer Meadow Park. This project is expected to be complete by mid-Summer 2020. Brief closures of the park may occur during work.

City Crack Sealing Program

The City will be conducting crack sealing operations on thoroughfares and main roads throughout the City in 2020. This will help prolong the life of our roadways. This is a rolling operation and moves very quickly. Please follow the directions of work crews and respect the construction vehicles. This project is expected to be complete by Fall 2020.

RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S HISTORY

THE GREAT MIAMI SHORES FLOOD OF 1959 - PART 1

This month we look back at the 1959 flood focusing on the Miami Shores area of Moraine. The 1959 flood is generally considered the second most disastrous flood next to the 1913 flood. The 1959 flood was the catalyst to obtain funds to create the levee around Miami Shores.

From January 20 to 21, 1959, six inches of rain fell in Montgomery County. The heavy rains fell on ground saturated and frozen by rain and snow from the previous week. The Great Miami River once again flooded its banks and residents were evacuated. Waters rose from the regular ground height of 716 feet at Shadyview Drive to a peak flood height of 720 feet.

The following are current and former Miami Shores residents and their memories of the 1959 flood.

Liz Sigler remembers that her house had knee high water on the first floor. Her husband Sonny (long-time former Moraine Fire Chief) put the stove up on blocks and carried many furnishings upstairs to save them. Looking at the flood water she cried and cried. They had to live temporarily at the mobile home court for two weeks while the house was cleaned up.

Sandy Payne remembers returning from school in 1959 and got stopped from going over the metal bridge into Miami Shores as Miami River water was splashing over the bridge.

Former Park Board Member Marie Fuller who lived on Recreation Drive recalled flood water came right in the window and was 36 inches deep in her basement ruining the coal furnace and tipping over the freezer which was up on blocks. Her family was rescued by rowboat. "On Recreation Drive water covered the mailboxes which were on posts at the street", added Fuller.

Payne and Fuller remember additional bad floods in Miami Shores in late 1940 and in the 1950's. One Dayton Daily News headline from a 1954 flood screamed, "14 foot flood crest heads south; two Miami Shores Youth are Sought". Payne provided several Miami Shores flood photos for this article. As a member of the Miami Shores Civic Association Fuller and her husband had been trying to get the Miami Conservancy District and the county to fund and build a levee for many years.

Bee Recycled Crafts

Creating a cute little bee or ladybug flower pot is a great way to help get kids get involved in gardening. You probably have some spare pots sitting around that you can recycle.

What you'll need:

- Flower pot and saucer
- Wooden ball knob
- 4 small wood knobs
- Acrylic craft paint
- Craft wire

Directions:

1. Hot glue the ball knob onto the saucer for the head. Glue 4 small wood knobs onto the bottom for the feet.
2. Paint the saucer, pot, ball knob and 4 small wood knobs to resemble a bumble bee or ladybug. Let dry.
3. Blush cheeks with red or pink paint and dot on eyes with white and black paint. Or, glue on craft eyes.
4. Bend a section of craft wire to create antennae and attach to head with a mini glue dot.

Get The Skinny Before Taking That Dip



With summer right around the corner many of us have thought about purchasing a swimming pool. Imagine relaxing on your raft as your cares float away. Or, listening to the kids splashing around, instead of being “bored with nothing to do.” Now before you go out and buy a pool take a look at Moraine’s codes and how they may affect your new swimming pool.

1181.04 STANDARDS FOR ACCESSORY BUILDINGS AND USES IN RESIDENTIAL AND AGRICULTURAL DISTRICTS.

g. Swimming Pools. No private swimming pool, exclusive of pools less than one and one-half (1 1/2) feet in depth and portable swimming pools with a diameter less than twelve (12) feet or with an area of less than 100 square feet, shall be allowed in any Residential District, except as an accessory use and located in the rear yard, and unless it complies with the following conditions and requirements.

1. The pool is intended and is to be used solely for the enjoyment of the occupants and guests of the principal use of the property on which it is located.
2. The pool may not be located closer than ten (10) feet to any property line, and such location shall be in accordance with all pertinent provisions of Section 1181.01 hereof and shall be measured from the water line. Accessory buildings shall maintain the minimum side yard required. Any walks or paved areas adjacent to the pools shall



be considered as patios for the purpose of this Zoning Code and shall conform to the provisions of subsection (e) hereof.

3. The swimming pool or the entire rear yard of the property on which it is located, shall be walled or fenced to prevent uncontrolled access by children from the street or from adjacent properties. Such fence or wall shall be six (6) feet in height and maintained in good condition with a gate and lock.

So will I have to spend another waterless summer in the heat or convincing my kids the bathtub is a swimming pool? No you can get that pool, but if your pool is over 18” deep or over 100 sq. ft. (blowups included) you will need the following.

- A permit for the pool and a 6’ fence (fence requires a separate permit), or
- An attached fence and locking steps (available on some pool models).

Sorry, at this time there is no code preventing the style of bathing suit your husband decides to wear. At this time we are just focused in on the safety of your pool. MORaine CARDBOARD BOAT REGATTA

Rules:

1. (3) Divisions: Single Youth, Single Adult, Multi-Crew (2 or more)
2. Boats will be propelled only by oars, canoe or kayak paddles. Boats must have sides. No surfboard style boats allowed.
3. The **ENTIRE** boat must be built from cardboard and duct tape. (No Painting)
4. Wood, metal, Styrofoam, paint, rubber inflatable devices or other materials that would provide buoyancy, and/or other materials that would aid flotation or make the hull rigid are prohibited. This applies to the keel, transom, ribs, hull, etc.
5. The boat's passenger area must not be enclosed above the occupant's shoulders so as to interfere with escape should the vessel instantly convert itself into a submarine!
6. During competition, crew must be visible **IN** the boat—not towing it, holding it between their legs, swimming or allowing the life jacket to provide the flotation of the vessel. Races will begin in the water with crew(s) in the boat. One or two people may steady a single crew boat or a multi-crew boat. No pushing boat is allowed.
7. Every crewmember must sign a "Hold Harmless" liability release before the race.
8. Every crewmember must wear an approved **Personal Flotation Device (Lifejacket)**
9. Boat design is left to the builders. Let your imagination take over; make your boat look like a race car, flying saucer, dragon, the Queen Mary, etc. Crew costumes are encouraged.
10. Sunken or discarded boats must be disposed of in the designated area.
11. Judges reserve the right to divide entrants into individual heats. Total elapsed time will determine winners to qualify.
12. Contestants are expected to maintain the decorum and dignity of a yachtsman and not behave like pirates.
