# **City Construction Update**

# Pinnacle Ridge Final Paving

The final surface paving of all roadways

within the Pinnacle Ridge subdivision will be completed this Summer/Fall.

### **2021 Concrete Program**

The City replaced curb and curb ramps on S. Dixie Drive. Curb ramps will also be installed in the West Moraine Plat. All work is expected to be complete by Fall 2021. Concrete curb and sidewalk repairs in Moraine are currently not assessed to the property owners.

### 2021 Paving Program

Paving is now complete on Hemple Road, Pinnacle Road (from Vance Road to Main Street), Soldiers Home Miamisburg Road, and Soldiers Home West Carrollton Road (North of Shank Road). Pinnacle Road (from Vance Road to Main Street) will be paved with Vance Road later this Summer/Fall.

### **Vance Road Resurfacing**

Vance Road will be resurfaced from Main Street to the City's northern corporation limit. This project is partially funded by a federal grant through the Ohio Department of Transportation and MVRPC. This project is expected to be completed by October 2021.

### **Haverstick South Improvements**

Roadway resurfacing, curb replacement, and curb ramp installation will be completed on Lehigh Place, Pensacola Blvd, Lauderdale Drive, Nyack Lane, Jomar Avenue, Genoa Avenue, Butler Avenue and Mays Avenue. Construction is expected to begin this Summer and will be completed by October 2021. This project is partially funded by a Community Development Block Grant through Montgomery County.

# **City Crack Sealing Program**

The City will be conducting crack sealing operations on thoroughfares and main roads throughout the City in 2021. This will help prolong the life of our roadways. This is a rolling operation and moves very quickly. Please follow the directions of work crews and respect the construction vehicles. This project is expected to be complete by Fall 2021.

The Greater Dayton Regional Transit Authority (RTA), in response to a severe current shortage of bus route operators along with decreased customer demand due to COVID-19, made temporary service adjustments.

# **Temporary Route Eliminations**

Route 3, Route 5, Route 23, Route 24, Route X5, Route X1A, Route X1B

# **Temporary Service Adjustments**

### Route 11 & Route 34

All bus route service will run every 90 minutes.

### Route 14

All bus route service will run every 80 minutes.

### Route 43

Saturday morning trips eliminated.

These changes are due to a lack of available bus drivers and were determined based on analysis of ridership on routes, specific trips, time periods experiencing lower ridership, and duplicative service coverage. The temporary eliminations will impact riders in Dayton, Oakwood, Kettering, Centerville, Miami Township, Miamisburg, West Carrollton, Moraine, Trotwood, Clayton, Englewood, and Wright-Patterson Air Force Base.

As the employment situation improves and ridership levels return system wide, RTA will look at ways to restore and even grow transit services were needed.

The I-75 Southbound to S.R. 741 (exit 50B) ramp will be closed for approximately 45 days, beginning in late June 2021. This is an Ohio Department of Transportation project that will realign the exit ramp and install a new traffic signal. This



project will improve the safety and efficiency of the ramp and signalized intersection. Signs regarding the specific date of the closure will be posted at least 14 days prior to the closure.

Detour: Dryden Road (exit 50A) to Northlawn Avenue to S.R. 741. Detour signage will be posted by ODOT.

# **Moraine's Trash Service Provided by City of Dayton**

Please note: Due to the Sunday, July 4th holiday, trash will be picked up Saturday, July 10.

Recycling containers provided by Republic Services were purchased by the City of Dayton for your continued use, free of charge. Moraine customers have the option to use your own trash containers with lids or to lease a 96 gallon roll-out waste container from the City of Dayton for \$24 per year. The leased 96 gallon roll-out waste trash containers will be billed in January for the entire year by the City of Dayton.

All waste collection services will be provided on Friday with the exception of weeks that a holiday has occurred. Trash collection services will then be moved to Saturday. Bulk waste collection services will be provided on a bi-weekly scheduled basis. Scheduled bulk waste will be collected on the scheduled Friday. To schedule please call 937-333-4800.

# Moraine Waste Collection Information and Guidelines:

- Please have your bulk waste items, waste container, or recycle container out by 7 a.m. on your collection day.
- 2. Please keep bulk, metal and tires separated. (They are picked up by separate trucks and must be scheduled for Bulk Pick Up)
- 3. Please DO NOT place any hot items into waste or recycling containers (i.e., ashes from fireplaces).
- 4. Please wrap, bag, or containerize all trash. DO NOT put loose waste out for collection.

# **Bulk Waste Disposal Information and Guidelines**

Some large items cannot be thrown away because they are too big to fit in your trash container. Bulk items include, but are not limited to furniture, carpet, metal appliances, mattresses, refrigerators and stoves

- 1. Call (937) 333-4800, no later than the Wednesday before your normal collection day, to schedule a bulk waste collection.
- Set items out by 7am the day of your scheduled bulk collection. If your regular trash is picked up at the curb, place bulk items in front of your home away from obstructions on your specially scheduled collection day.
- Bundle, bag or containerize all small items. (Keep your neighborhood clean of loose debris.)
- 4. Roll carpet into a bundle 4 feet long by 2 feet in diameter and tie it with rope.
- 5. Leave furniture assembled.
- 6. Tie brush, tree limbs, and carpet into bundles not heavier than 25 pounds, no larger than 4 feet in length, and no bigger than 18 inches in diameter.
- 7. Yard waste (brush, clippings, tree limbs, etc.) must be tied into bundles not larger than 4 feet long and 18 inches in diameter. Bundles are limited to 25 pounds each.
- 8. Glass must be taped.
- Residents are responsible for cleaning up any glass residue that may remain on the ground in front of their home as a result of collection.
- 10. The City of Dayton <u>cannot</u> collect: sheet rock (drywall), concrete, rocks, bricks, blocks, sand, gravel, paint, construction materials, or hazardous waste. (Examples of hazardous waste are paint, oil, gas containers, etc.)

# RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S HISTORY

NEW MORAINE HISTORICAL MARKER DEDICATED By Dave Miller

A new Historical Marker was recently erected designating the City's first schoolhouse. The schoolhouse, located at 3562 Vance Road, is now a private residence but has quite a history.

In 1883, county authorities established District 12. The first school was held in farmer Felix Yeasal's living room, located about 200 yards west of the intersection of Vance and Sellars Roads. The first teacher was Miss Anna Christman who went on to a 40 year teaching career.

In 1885, the City's first schoolhouse was a brick building. The township board of education purchased property on the corner of Vance and Pinnacle Roads at the foot of Pinnacle Hill from Isaac Lesher and a brick building was erected. Albert Patterson was the first teacher and had a special helper, a bearded man called the "hermit" who kept a cabin near the school and visited it frequently. He assisted the teacher and students by starting a fire in the stove each morning during cold weather. It was recorded that attendance at the school in 1890 was 14 pupils and in 1891 only six children attended.

Children at the school were treated to quite a surprise in August 1914. Former Mayor Carl Gerhardt was a student and remembered when his teacher, Mrs. Prass announced that the Wright Brothers were testing their new hydro-aeroplane (seaplane) on the nearby Miami River in Moraine. Mrs. Prass dismissed the class so that all of the students could go down to the river and watch. Mayor Gerhardt commented on how thrilled the students were to see this rare accomplishment of flight by Orville Wright and land on the river.

In 1924, the smaller school districts throughout the county were consolidated. Many one and two room schoolhouses were closed and combined into larger modern facilities.


District No. 12 was dissolved and consolidated into West Carrollton Exempted Village School District. The schoolhouse is now a private residence so the public is asked to respect the privacy of the owners.

This new Historical Marker is the 16th erected in the City. The first ten markers were dedicated in 2015 as part of the City's 50th Anniversary Celebration. Pick up a "Moraine Historical Marker Self Guided Tour Brochure" at the Municipal Building, PRC or GCC and learn the location and history of each marker.

# FIREWORKS SAFETY: PROTECT PEOPLE, PROPERTY &

With warm weather and family events, the Fourth of July can be a fun time with great memories. Before your family celebrates, make sure everyone knows about fireworks safety.

If not handled properly, fireworks can cause burns and eye injuries. Every year hospital emergency departments treat hundreds of injuries as a result of fireworks.

The only types of fireworks that can be legally purchased and discharged in Ohio are trick and novelty devices. These include items that smoke, sparkle, snap and snake.

Sparklers burn at approximately 1,200 degrees Fahrenheit. Clothing ignites at approximately 900 degrees Fahrenheit. People who know how, when, and where to use fireworks will reduce the number and severity of injuries and dollar loss.

Other fireworks, like firecrackers and bottle rockets, can be legally purchased in the state, but you must be 18 years of age and agree to take them out of Ohio to discharge. Firing them off within the state boundaries is prohibited and stiff penalties can be applied for the illegal possession or discharge of fireworks. It is a first-degree misdemeanor for non-licensed individuals to discharge fireworks in Ohio, to falsify an application when purchasing fireworks, or to possess them for more than 48 hours without taking them out-of-state. First time offenders are subject to up to a \$1,000 fine and six months imprisonment.

If you choose to use fireworks, the Fire Division encourages you to follow these guidelines:

1. Kids should never play with fireworks because they are too dangerous. If you give kids sparklers, make sure they keep

- them outside and away from their face, clothing, and hair.
- 2. Never try to make your own fireworks.
- 3. Steer clear of others fireworks have been known to backfire or shoot off in the wrong direction. Never throw or point fireworks at someone in jest.
- 4. Don't hold fireworks in your hand or have any part of your body over them while lighting. Wear eye protection and avoid carrying fireworks in your pocket friction can set them off.
- 5. Light one firework at a time (not in a glass or metal containers) and NEVER relight a dud.
- 6. Don't allow kids to pick up pieces of fireworks after an event. Some may still be ignited and can explode at any time.
- 7. Soak all fireworks in a bucket of water before throwing them in the trash can.
- 8. Think about your pet. Animals have sensitive ears and can be extremely frightened or stressed on the 4th of July. Keep pets indoors to reduce the risk that they'll run loose or get injured.

### **Parents**

Actions by children under the age of 18 are the legal responsibility of parents. Misuse of fireworks causing death, injury, or property loss could incur civil liability.

### **For Your Pets**

The Humane Society encourages pet owners to keep their pets indoors and make sure their animals have identification tags in case they run away. Pets may refuse to eat, become hyperactive, or run away from home because of the noise from fireworks.

# **Always**

- Read and follow label directions.
- Buy from reliable fireworks sellers.

# PETS FROM FIREWORKS

- Ignite outdoors.
- Store in a cool, dry place.
- Have a responsible adult present.
- Have water or a fire extinguisher handy.
- Use fireworks outdoors, away from buildings and dry fields.
- Light one item at a time; move away quickly, and keep a safe distance.
- Dispose of used fireworks by first soaking them in water.

# Never

- Re-ignite malfunctioning fireworks.
- Give to small children.
- Carry fireworks in your pocket.
- Alter or experiment with fireworks.
- Discharge fireworks near flammable liquids or in a glass or metal container.
- Use fireworks in a crowd or throw them at people, pets, or moving vehicles

Fireworks are meant to be enjoyed, but you'll enjoy them much more knowing your family is safe. The Fire Division encourages you to take extra precautions this Fourth of July and your holiday will be a blast!



# Parks and Recreation Month


Every person has a park story. Every park has a history made up of thousands of stories that help to define it.
