

# **City Construction Update:**

Updated information regarding construction zones will be posted on the City's social media pages.

#### 2022 Concrete Program

The City will be replacing curb and curb ramps in German Village. All work is expected to be completed by Fall 2022. Concrete curb and sidewalk repairs in Moraine are not currently assessed to the property owners.

#### 2022 Paving Program

The City will be resurfacing Charlotte Mill Drive, Loveland Court, Pinnacle Park Drive, Parallel Road, Paris Drive, Sellars Road, Angus Lane, and Herford Trail. A large repair will also be made on the north end of Arbor Blvd, near Carillon Blvd. All work is expected to be completed by Fall 2022.

#### 2022 Concrete Pavement Program

Concrete pavement will be replaced at the southern intersection of Dryden Road and East River Road. New concrete pavement will be installed on eastbound Stroop Road at South Dixie Drive and on westbound Northlawn Avenue at Dryden Road. All work is expected to be completed by Fall 2022.

#### **Dryden Road North Resurfacing**

Dryden Road will be resurfaced from Kreitzer Road to the City's north Corporation limit. Curb repair, sidewalk and curb ramp installation, and a traffic signal replacement at Dryden Road and East River Road are also included in this project. This project is partially funded by a federal grant through the Ohio Department of Transportation and MVRPC. This project is also partially funded by an Ohio Public Works Commission Grant. All work is expected to be completed by October 2022.

#### **Cobblegate Drive Improvements**


This project has been delayed until 2023. This project is partially funded by a Community Development Block Grant through Montgomery County.

#### **City Crack Sealing Program**

The City will be conducting crack sealing operations on thoroughfares and main roads throughout the City in 2022. This will help prolong the life of our roadways. This is a rolling operation and moves very quickly. Please follow the directions of work crews and respect the construction vehicles. This project is expected to be completed by Fall 2022.



With many professional firework shows being canceled this year, it is important to know that **fireworks are not safe in the hands of consumers**. Fireworks cause thousands of injuries each year.

#### A few ideas to get into the patriotic spirit, without fireworks:

- **1.** Use glow sticks, they glow in the dark and are a safe alternative to a sparkler. Fun for all ages.
- 2. Loud and proud. Noise makers are sure to make a statement. They can be found at local party supply stores or make your own.
- **3.** Outdoor movie night. Set up a screen and projector. Don't forget the bug spray!
- 4. Red, white and blue silly string ... fun for all ages.
- 5. Make a patriotic craft with the family.
- 6. Throw a birthday party for the USA, and don't forget the cake.



#### FACTS

- () More than 19,500 reported fires are started by fireworks annually.
- (1) Burns account for 44% of the 9,100 injuries treated in emergency rooms seen in the month around July 4.
- Half of the fireworks injuries seen at emergency rooms were extremities: hand, finger, or leg. One-third were to the eye or other parts of the head.
- (1) Children ages 10–14 had the highest rate of fireworks injury, with more than one-third (36%) of the victims of fireworks injuries under age 15.
- Sparklers account for roughly one-quarter of emergency room fireworks injuries.

# RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S HISTORY

DAYTON WRIGHT AIRPLANE COMPANY & THE WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE MOVEMENT Written by: Dave Miller

Remember Rosie the Riveter - the World War II symbol of women in the workplace and their fight for independence? Women played a huge part in helping to win World War II. The women were nurses, WACS and worked in the important industrial plants producing munitions and related war supplies. Men sent to the battlefields in WWII created a large shortage of workers and women filled that gap in factories and shipyards.

However, near the end of World War I women also filled a large role working in positions previously closed to them. In 1917, the 19th Amendment (pertaining to voting rights for women) was still 3 years



away from being ratified by the Federal Government, but the women's suffrage movement had been going on for some time. Two major components beyond the right to vote were for women to have equal access to education and employment.

The Dayton Wright Airplane Company (on Springboro Pike in Moraine) is a good example of the culture of the times in terms of women's employment. A Dayton Herald newspaper article dated July 14, 1917, had the blaring headline, "No Decision on Employment of Working Women - Opinions Differ Over the Best Employees in Factories Making Airplanes for War." The article states that no decision had been made yet whether to employ women on the production line or depend largely on expert mechanics. Dayton Wright officials, Charles Kettering and H. E. Talbott, visited the Royal Flying Corps field in Toronto, Canada and inspected the airplane factory there. Although leaving undecided, they then investigated a New Jersey airplane plant where 60% of the workforce were women making airplane wings.

Dayton Wright management wisely concluded to use women and set a goal of having at least 35% women working as soon as the plant shops were enlarged. They expected thousands to be working on airplanes within a few months. The photos show women working in various capacities on engines, wings and fuselage of America's first bomber aircraft, the De Havilland DH-4. Plant managers praised women workers for their light touch and careful manipulation of sensitive machines. Overall, 3,106 bombers were made at Moraine's plant by the end of World War I. The success can be attributed to the hard-working women who filled in and kept war production going.
