Progress Through Unity

Moraine is Honored to Become a Purple Heart City

The City of Moraine is proud to honor our military men and women as we become an official Purple Heart City on October 28, 2021.

The Order of the Purple Heart for Military Merit, established by General George Washington during the Revolutionary War at Newburgh, New York, on August 7th, 1782, is the oldest military decoration in the world in present use. The Military Order of the Purple Heart began in 1932 and was chartered by an Act of Congress in 1958. It was also composed of military men and women who received the Purple Heart Medal.

The Military Order of the Purple Heart was formed for the protection and mutual interest of all who have received the combat decoration and is composed exclusively of Purple Heart Recipients and is the only congressionally chartered veterans service organization comprised strictly of "combat" veterans. The Purple Heart is awarded in the name of the President of the United States to members of the Armed Forces wounded in combat with an enemy force or posthumously to the next of kin of Armed Forces members killed in combat.

A ceremony will take place during the Council Meeting on Thursday, October 28, 2021 at 6:00 p.m. at the Municipal Building located at 4200 Dryden Road. The Military Order of the Purple Heart Honor Guard will present a plaque and Mayor Elaine Allison will read a proclamation. All are welcome to attend.

Hydrant Testing

The Fire Division will be performing the semi-annual test of the City's hydrants starting October 1st and continuing throughout the month. The hydrants are checked twice a year to ensure they are working properly. These tests enable the Fire Division to be better prepared to protect and serve the public. During these tests, the water may turn brown. Residents should avoid doing laundry and drinking water from the tap until the discoloration clears.



Senior Citizen / Handicap Driveway Plowing

During the winter season, the Street Division provides driveway plowing services for senior citizens and handicapped residents only when snow accumulation is 2 inches or more. Please note: this is the Street Division's last priority for snow-plowing. Requirements for receiving this service are:

- Must be 60 years of age or older.
- Must live alone.
- Exceptions: Handicapped persons who have a verified medical problem may qualify for this service.

Along with meeting all requirements, senior citizens must register in person each year at the Street Division (4720 Vance Road) in order to be eligible for this service. Our list of registrants is updated yearly. Please note if you do not register yearly, your driveway will not be plowed that particular year. City Construction Spotlight

Using Grant Funding to Stretch Paving Dollars

Infrastructure improvements and street paving work around the City were in full force in 2021! With the City Capital Improvement Program (CIP), paving funds were used to make needed repairs and resurfacing on the west side of the City. The paving work included Hemple Road, Soldiers Home-Miamisburg Road, Shank Road, Soldiers Home-West Carrollton Road and Pinnacle Road.

In addition to the City's CIP budget, additional paving work was completed thanks to partial grant funding secured by the City Engineer. Federal Surface Transportation Program (STP) grant dollars were secured for the paving of Vance Road, cutting the City's cost for this project by nearly 60%. Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding was secured for the Haverstick South Improvements Project (which included Lehigh Place, Pensacola Blvd., Lauderdale Drive, Genoa Avenue, Jomar Avenue, Nyack Lane, Butler Avenue and Mays Avenue). This CDBG funding reduced the City's cost for the project by nearly 50%.

Looking forward to 2022, Moraine will continue to see the positive effects of grant funding. The northern portion of Dryden Road will be repaired and resurfaced using a combination of a \$1.05 million STP grant and a \$400,000 Ohio Public Works Commission Grant, bringing down the City's cost for the project by more than 99%! The City will also see a new traffic signal installed with safety improvements at the intersection of SR 741 and W. Dorothy Lane. This project will be funded by a 100% safety grant through the Ohio Department of Transportation.

Further grant funds are being pursued by the City Engineer's office for future STP and CDBG grants to continue similar projects throughout the City. State and Federal grant dollars are often only able to be used on high volume and main roadways. Securing these grants for the City's thoroughfares allows the local CIP dollars to be used on our residential and rural roadways.

WATER RECREATION THROUGH THE YEARS ON THE GREAT MIAMI RIVER - PART 2

Last month's article was about the 1930s promotions in the Miami Shores for lots that were available for permanent dwellings or summer cabins. This was in hopes of attracting people to live in the area and to enjoy the recreational opportunities the river had to offer. The housing development continued into the 1950s.

During the 1930s, the Miami Valley Sports Club located near the old Main Street steel bridge, promoted recreational canoeing, boating, skiing and motorboat races.

In the 1950s and 1960s several ski ramps were placed in the river opposite Miami Shores. Just south of the Main Street Bridge and just north of Holes Creek was a small island called Wizard Island where you could anchor your boat and fish.

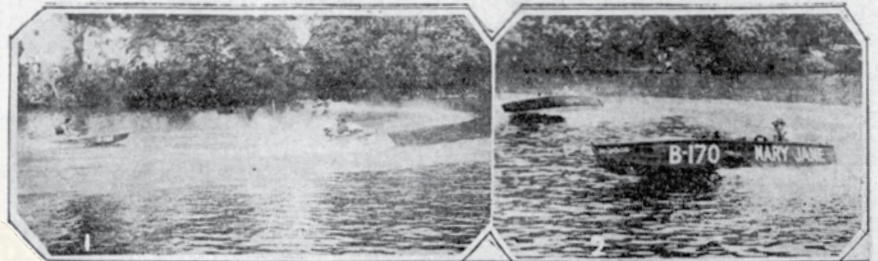
However, Miami Shores residents constantly dealt with seasonal flooding running over the riverbanks but the 1959 flood was the last straw. In 1960 and 1961, the Miami Conservancy District spent \$3 million dollars to build a levee around Miami Shores. Wizard Island was dredged and removed in 1960 as part of the levee plans. The low dams were added in the Miami River both north and south Moraine, which made the river depth consistent and safe for boating.

The Dayton Boat Club was founded in 2003 on East River Road and provides competitive-focused Junior (ages 11-18), Masters (ages 21+) rowing programs. The Club offers Learn to Row summer camps and is utilized by the University of Dayton Rowing Teams.

Today, there are countless water recreation opportunities to take advantage of such as boating, water skiing, jet skiing, tubing, kayaking, canoeing, rowing or fishing by boat. The river is accessible from the East River Landing Boat Ramp. When kayaking you could see turtles, beaver, deer, raccoons, geese, ducks, cranes, blue herons and fish galore jumping.

Even if you are not on the water, you can also enjoy the sights of the river by using the Moraine bike stairs on the Main Street Bridge to access the Great Miami Valley Recreation Bicycle/Walking Trail. With the pandemic and limited travel, America saw unprecedented sales of kayaks, bicycles and fishing gear as people have rediscovered outdoor recreation. Why don't you?

2021 CHRISTMAS SMILES PROGRAM

Christmas can be a very stressful time. If you need help providing Christmas gifts to your family, the City might be able to help you this holiday season. Through this free program, we provide Christmas gifts and a food box for children in need in our community. We collect basic

information for each child, including clothing sizes and Christmas wishes. Once we gather all of that information, the children are selected by individuals and families in our local community that want to help.



Those individuals and families purchase Christmas presents for your child, which typically include clothing, shoes, winter necessities and items from your child's wish list. We coordinate a day in December for you to come pick everything up well before the actual holiday, to allow you time to wrap your child's gifts and have a wonderful meal on Christmas day. If you are interested in this program, please see the information below regarding the application process.

2021 Application Process

Qualifying for the Program

To qualify for the program, your child must meet all of the following criteria:

1. Child must be a Moraine resident.
2. Child must be on free or reduced lunch program* through their school.
3. Child must be between the ages of newborn to 17 at the time of application.

**Qualifications for the free and reduced lunch program will be validated through the child's school.*

Application Process

- Step #1: Please complete all of the questions on the online 'Christmas Smiles Application' form to submit the first portion of your application for the 2021 Christmas Smiles program with the City of Moraine Parks and Recreation Division. This form must be completed by Thursday, October 21st. You can find the form here: <https://ci.moraine.oh.us/christmas-smiles/>.
- Step #2: You will be required to come in person to the PRC during one of our designated dates and times to verify your information for the program. See available dates and times below:
- Monday, October 25th between 4pm – 7pm
 - Tuesday, October 26th between 4pm – 7pm
 - Wednesday, October 27th between 4pm – 7pm

To complete this portion of the application, you are required to bring the following items with you:

1. Proof of Moraine Residency
 - Acceptable proof must be in your name with your Moraine address listed, also dated within 30 days of the application date.
 - Water Bill (Montgomery County Environmental Services)
 - Gas Bill (Vectren, CenterPoint Energy, etc.)
 - Electric Bill (DP&L or AES)
2. Parent / Guardian Verification
 - State issued Photo ID, including a valid Driver's License or other valid state issued Photo ID.
3. Child Verification - Each child must show one of the following:
 - An official certified birth certificate.
 - Court issued documentation of custody of each child.

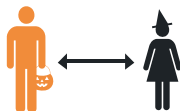
