KEEP STORM SEWERS CLEAR

During the winter months, it is important to remember to keep storm drain openings clear so that when snows melt, the runoff can enter the storm sewers and not cause ice build-up along the road. Don't allow leaves or grass to lay in the street blocking storm drains. Over time, they can get into the storm system and cause water back-up, potentially creating street flooding in heavy storm events.



Nothing—grass clippings, leaves, yard debris, paint or oil, etc.—should ever be dumped in an open drainageway or storm sewer. Laws prohibit dumping in or blocking drainageways and violators may be prosecuted. If you observe someone illegally dumping into a storm sewer or body of water, notify the City. The Ohio EPA has established guidelines regarding illegal dumping in stormwater drainage systems. More information may also be found on the Ohio EPA website.

Snow Removal Guidelines

In order for the Street Division to properly and efficiently plow and clear roadways, cooperation and assistance is needed from residents. Please follow these snow removal guidelines:

- Do not clean your driveway until your street has been plowed and salted. If you choose to clean your driveway prior to plowing and salting of your street, be sure to push the snow to the right of your driveway so when we plow it doesn't block your driveway. If using a snow blower, we ask that you avoid blowing snow back into the street.
- If a snowstorm consists of 2 inches or more, please park all vehicles in your driveway.
 This will greatly assist the Street Division in properly clearing and plowing all roadways and residential streets. Our goal is to make road conditions as safe as possible for travel throughout the City.

Senior Citizen / Handicap Driveway Plowing

During the winter season, the Street
Division provides driveway plowing
services for senior citizens and
handicapped residents only when
snow accumulation is 2 inches or
more. Please note: this is the Street
Division's last priority for snow-plowing.
Requirements for receiving this service
are:

- Must be 60 years of age or older.
- Must live alone.
- Exceptions: Handicapped persons who have a verified medical problem may qualify for this service.

Along with meeting all requirements, senior citizens must register in person each year at the Street Division (4720 Vance Road) in order to be eligible for this service. Our list of registrants is updated yearly. Please note if you do not register yearly, your driveway will not be plowed that particular year. RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S HISTORY

THE DAGMAR INN & 1930's PROHIBITION GANGSTERS By: Dave Miller

Did you know in the late 1920's and 1930's Moraine had one of the most modern and best Inn's in America according to the Dayton Herald Newspaper? The Dagmar Inn.

The Dagmar Inn was located on the Cincinnati-Dayton Pike (today's South Dixie Drive) just to the left (east) of where today's Dryden Road dead ends into South Dixie/Central Avenue. Picture the incredible setting (see map) as three historical transportation icons flank the Inn. The remnants of the Miami & Erie Canal in Moraine are to the west of the Inn. The C & D Interurban Traction Line trolleys run directly behind the Inn to drop off passengers and the famous Great Miami Turnpike (Cincinnati-Dayton Pike) built in 1840 runs in front.

Owner/Proprietor Harry "Tommy" Williamson left nothing out - nothing was spared. The Inn had two bathrooms, toilets, lavatories with hard and soft water plus great food which Williamson has been known for in the past. Very luxurious for back then. Williamson catered to the very best cast of trade and aimed to conduct business with strict accordance with hotel practices and regulations. With one exception - he needed booze to serve at the Dagmar Inn to patrons.

But this was the Roaring 20's and the Prohibition Era in America. Neighborhood taverns closed everywhere but the public taste for liquor remained. People found ways to skirt the law buying booze through bootleggers or having their own home still. The Thursday, January 27, 1927 Dayton Herald Newspaper article headlines blared "Dagmar Proprietor Bought Whisky From Friend" and

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violated the National Prohibition Act. Williamson was one of seven Dayton area people brought up on charges. Williamson was accused of buying at least one gallon of alcohol and quantities of illegal beer from infamous bootleggers John and Mary Friend.

Maybe not as well known as gangster John Dillinger and Bugs Moran's criminal exploits in Dayton, the Friends were a top criminal name during prohibition as they were called the "King & Queen of Dayton Bootleggers." They lived in an exclusive Oakwood neighborhood and reigned from 1924 to 1931. The Dayton newspaper said the Friends "made thousands of dollars out of their alleged illegal transactions in liquor." Eventually, in 1931 John & Mary Friend were both convicted for violating the Prohibition Act and served time in Federal Prison.

As for Williamson, he avoided jail time and paid a fine. It's unknown whether Williamson was able to eventually provide booze at the Inn until prohibition was over but it is believed that the Inn was successful offering great food along with its luxurious accommodations. Although we could find no other information on the Dagmar Inn, the building itself was still there in a 1949 aerial photo whether it was still operating as the Inn or not.

Jeff is an active member of Urban Crest Baptist Church for 20 plus years. He is also a member of the Southern Baptist Disaster Relief Team. Now that he is retired, Jeff plans on being more involved in mission trips along with helping wherever needed across the United States for disaster relief.
