The first Sunday in November is when Daylight Savings Time ends in most areas of the U.S., so in 2022 we'll "fall back" one hour and return to Standard Time on Sunday, November 6, 2022, at 2 am. Be sure to set your clocks back one hour before bed Saturday night!



Snow Removal Guidelines

In order for the Street Division to properly and efficiently plow and clear roadways, cooperation and assistance is needed from residents. Please follow these snow removal guidelines:

- Do not clean your driveway until your street has been plowed and salted. If you choose to clean your driveway prior to plowing and salting of your street, be sure to push the snow to the right of your driveway so when we plow it doesn't block your driveway. If using a snow blower, we ask that you avoid blowing snow back into the street.
- If a snowstorm consists of 2 inches or more, please park all vehicles in your driveway. This will greatly assist the Street Division in properly clearing and plowing all roadways and residential streets. Our goal is to make road conditions as safe as possible for travel throughout the City.

Senior Citizen / Handicap Driveway Plowing

During the winter season, the Street Division provides driveway plowing services for senior citizens and handicapped residents only when snow accumulation is 2 inches or more. Please note: this is the Street Division's last priority for snowplowing. Requirements for receiving this service are:

- Must be 60 years of age or older.
- Must live alone.
- Exceptions: Handicapped persons who have a verified medical problem may qualify for this service.

Along with meeting all requirements, senior citizens must register in person each year at the Street Division (4720 Vance Road) in order to be eligible for this service. Our list of registrants is updated yearly. Please note: if you do not register yearly, your driveway will not be plowed that particular year. If you have any questions, please contact the Street Division at 937-535-1040.

RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S HISTORY

21st ANNIVERSARY OF THE MORAINE ALL-VETERANS MEMORIAL

The Moraine All-Veterans Memorial was dedicated on November 10, 2001. The idea for the memorial came from original committee members Alex Merch, Phyllis Wagers, Councilman John Shady, Mayor Roger Matheny and me. Alex Merch was a veteran of WWII and Korea. I spent a great deal of time working with Alex on how to fund the project. We decided we would solicit corporate and individual donations and sell engraved bricks to create a pathway in front of the memorial.



After researching several companies, Alex and I worked with Dodds Memorials in Xenia to design the memorial. Dodds Memorials had vast experience in designing and building war memorials in the Dayton and southwest Ohio areas and provided the brick engraving service. The Moraine All-Veterans Memorial design consisted of five dark grey granite pillars each representing a branch of the military atop a light granite footing. Above the 12-foot-tall memorial is an eagle and the words "Lest We Forget."

Alex and I presented the design idea to Moraine City Council with a five-year plan to raise enough money to fund the project. City Council liked the idea and Councilman Ron Payne recommended a resolution to fund \$35,000 through the Moraine Foundation to provide additional money needed to immediately start the project.

Thanks to local companies (Wells Electric, Barnett Brothers Construction, Siebenthaler Co., Gerdes Turf Farm, Snyder Brick & Block and Mainline Road & Bridge Construction), shrubs, flowers, landscaping materials and labor were donated to beautify the area around the memorial. Susie Leet (formerly of the Moraine Street Division) added the wonderful military statues around the bricks and did an outstanding job keeping the beautiful flowers weeded and growing.

The walkway consisted of over 575 bricks. The dedication in 2001 was hosted by Mayor Roger Matheny, the West Carrollton VFW Post 3438 provided Taps and a 15-gun salute, Tiffany Thompson sang the national anthem, the invocation was presented by Pastor Henry Watts, Jr. and the guest speaker was Air Force Col. Mark Shackelford. Fourth and fifth grade students from Moraine Meadows performed patriotic songs.

Today, the walkway of engraved bricks, dedicated to family or friends who served in war or peacetime, continues to grow. To order an engraved brick, please contact Public Information Officer Aaron Vietor at 937-535-1016.

Memorial to veterans on way in Moraine

City's foundation will pay for project

MORaine—A lasting memorial to veterans will soon rise in Moraine, the vision of an 80-year-old Moraine man who served in World War II and Korea.

Alex Merch appeared before the city council this summer and asked for financial assistance for the endeavor, and the city's charitable arm, the Moraine Foundation, agreed to provide the \$35,000 funding.

The money will be used to build the main structure, five dark grey granite pillars representing the five branches of the military, atop a light granite footing. Above the pillars is another light grey slab inscribed with Moraine Veterans Memorial and a dedication.

Atop the 12-foot tall memorial is an eagle and the words Lest We Forget.

Dodds Monuments in Xenia

designed the memorial, which is expected to be finished in time for dedication on Nov. 11, Veterans Day.

It will be built on the lawn in front of the Moraine Municipal Building, 4300 Dryden Road, at Main Street.

Merch is working with the Moraine All Veterans Memorial Committee and plans to sell bricks to memorialize a loved one who served in the military. The bricks will form a pathway around the memorial and include walkways.

The bricks sell from \$50 for a 4-by-8 inch brick, to \$250 for a 12-by-12 inch brick.

Money contributed to the project will also be used to help defray costs of lighting, benches and landscaping, he said.

Merch said the first brick has been bought by his two stepdaughters, Phyllis Wagers and Karen Sharpe, in memory of their father, George Sharpe, a Navy veteran who died of leukemia.

Merch, who had throat cancer 17 years ago and speaks with the assistance of mechanical voice box, attends most city council meetings. He said he wanted the memorial

would be an asset to the city and something that could bring pride to the community.

The idea for the memorial came about, Merch said, when he and Wagers, Mayor Roger V. Matheny and Councilman John Shady attended the 50th anniversary of the start of the Korean War on June 25, 2000, at the memorial on Riverside Drive in Dayton.

Assisting Merch on the committee is David Miller, who works for the city's parks and recreation department.

Miller also has purchased a brick for his father, Eugene, 85, of Florida, who served in the Pacific during World War II, and whose Navy ship was torpedoed by enemy fire.

He said his father was playing Major League baseball in Philadelphia when he was drafted.

"My dad doesn't like to talk about the war, but he has an undying love for the country. That's my interest in following up on this," Miller said.

Cooking Safety

Cooking brings family and friends together, provides an outlet for creativity and can be relaxing. But did you know that cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries? By following a few safety tips you can prevent these fires.

"COOK WITH CAUTION"

- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove or stovetop.
- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire — oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your stovetop.

If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire...

- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire...

- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.
- Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number from outside the home.



Have a "kid-free zone" of at least 3 feet (1 meter) around the stove and areas where hot food or drink is prepared or carried.

- ! The leading cause of fires in the kitchen is unattended cooking.
- ! Most cooking fires in the home involve the kitchen stove.

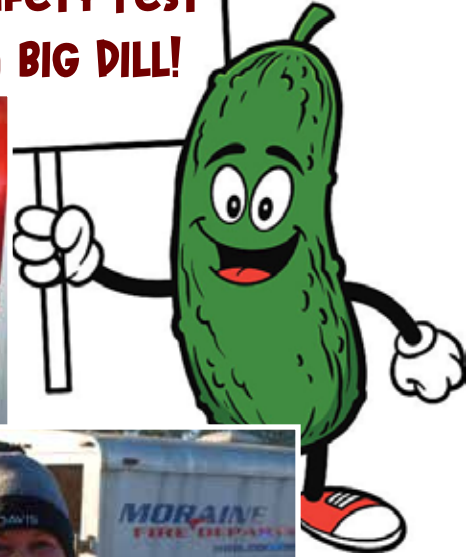
