Snow Removal Guidelines

In order for the Street Division to properly and efficiently plow and clear roadways, cooperation and assistance is needed from residents. Please follow these snow removal guidelines:

- Do not clean your driveway until your street has been plowed and salted. If you choose to clean your driveway prior to plowing and salting of your street, be sure to push the snow to the right of your driveway so when we plow it doesn't block your driveway. If using a snow blower, we ask that you avoid blowing snow back into the street.
- If a snowstorm consists of 2 inches or more, please park all vehicles in your driveway. This will greatly assist the Street Division in properly clearing and plowing all roadways and residential streets. Our goal is to make road conditions as safe as possible for travel throughout the City.

Senior Citizen / Handicap Driveway Plowing

During the winter season, the Street
Division provides driveway plowing
services for senior citizens and
handicapped residents only when snow
accumulation is 2 inches or more. Please
note: this is the Street Division's last
priority for snowplowing. Requirements for
receiving this service are:

- Must be 60 years of age or older.
- Must live alone.
- Exceptions: Handicapped persons who have a verified medical problem may qualify for this service.

Along with meeting all requirements, senior citizens must register in person each year at the Street Division (4720 Vance Road) in order to be eligible for this service. Our list of registrants is updated yearly. Please note: if you do not register yearly, your driveway will not be plowed that particular year. RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S HISTORY

21st ANNIVERSARY OF THE MORAINE ALL-VETERANS MEMORIAL Written by: Dave Miller

The Moraine All-Veterans Memorial was dedicated on November 10, 2001. The idea for the memorial came from original committee members Alex Merch, Phyllis Wagers, Councilman John Shady, Mayor Roger Matheny and me. Alex Merch was a veteran of WWII and Korea. I spent a great deal of time working with Alex on how to fund the project. We decided we would solicit corporate and individual donations and sell engraved bricks to create a pathway in front of the memorial.



After researching several companies, Alex and I worked with Dodds Memorials in Xenia to design the memorial. Dodds Memorials had vast experience in designing and building war memorials in the Dayton and southwest Ohio areas and provided the brick engraving service. The Moraine All-Veterans Memorial design consisted of five dark grey granite pillars each representing a branch of the military atop a light granite footing. Above the 12-foot-tall memorial is an eagle and the words "Lest We Forget."

Alex and I presented the design idea to Moraine City Council with a five-year plan to raise enough money to fund the project. City Council liked the idea and Councilman Ron Payne recommended a resolution to fund \$35,000 through the Moraine Foundation to provide additional money needed to immediately start the project.

Thanks to local companies (Wells Electric, Barnett Brothers Construction, Siebenthaler Co., Gerdes Turf Farm, Snyder Brick & Block and Mainline Road & Bridge Construction), shrubs, flowers, landscaping materials and labor were donated to beautify the area around the memorial. Susie Leet (formerly of the Moraine Street Division) added the wonderful military statues around the bricks and did an outstanding job keeping the beautiful flowers weeded and growing.

The walkway consisted of over 575 bricks. The dedication in 2001 was hosted by Mayor Roger Matheny, the West Carrollton VFW Post 3438

Cooking brings family and friends together, provides an outlet for creativity and can be relaxing. But did you know that cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries? By following a few safety tips you can prevent these fires.

"COOK WITH CAUTION"


- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove or stovetop.
- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels or curtains — away from your stovetop.

If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire...

- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire...


- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.

MUNICIPAL BUILDING MEMORIALS

The City has two memorials to recognize our former employees and veterans.

The Police and Fire Memorial was constructed in 2012. It has two large bronze statues: one firefighter and one police officer, with plaques, as well as 275 bricks to remember our Fire and Police personnel.

The All-Veterans memorial was constructed in 2001. It has a large monument with each branch of the military, as well as 575 bricks to remember our veterans.


