GRAVITY GAMES WRAP UP

In an emergency, every second counts! In order to provide clear access to fire hydrants, always clear snow from around fire hydrants. Clear the snow a minimum of 3 feet in all directions of a fire hydrant. This can save a fire crew precious minutes.

Help keep storm drains clear! To prevent flooding during snowmelt events, clear snow from the storm drains in the roadways to allow melted snow to drain.

Before your street is plowed, we recommend the following.

Using this method to clear snow will reduce the amount of snow that accumulates at the end of your driveway!



Snow Removal Guidelines

In order for the Street Division to properly and efficiently plow and clear roadways, cooperation and assistance is needed from residents. Please follow these snow removal guidelines:

- Do not clean your driveway until your street has been plowed and salted by the Street Division. If you choose to clean your driveway prior to the Street Division plowing and salting your street, be sure to push the snow to the right of your driveway so when we plow it doesn't block your driveway. If using a snow blower, we ask that you avoid blowing snow back into the street.
- If a snowstorm is 2 inches or more, please park all vehicles in your driveway. This will greatly assist the Street Division in properly clearing and plowing all roadways and residential streets. Our goal is to make road conditions as safe as possible for travel through the City.

Senior Citizen and Handicap Driveway Plowing

During the winter season, the Street Division provides driveway plowing services for senior citizens and handicapped residents of Moraine. This service is provided only when snow accumulation is 2 inches or more. Please note: this is the Street Division's last priority for snow plowing. Requirements for receiving this service are:

- Must be 60 years of age or older.
- Must live alone.
- Exceptions: Handicapped persons who have a verified medical problem may qualify for this service.

Along with meeting all requirements, senior citizens must register in person each year at the Street Division (4720 Vance Road) in order to be eligible for this service. Our list of registrants is updated yearly. Please note if you do not register yearly, your driveway will not be plowed that particular year. If you have any questions, please contact the Street Division at 535-1040.

Christmas Tree Disposal

The Street Division will be collecting Christmas trees for disposal after the holidays. If you would like to dispose of your Christmas tree, please place it at the curb for pick up.

RESEARCH, DISCOVER AND UNCOVER MORAINE'S HISTORY

THE MORAINE BUILT CURTISS JENNY

Just over one hundred years ago in 1917 and 1918 about 400 of the Standard J (or Jenny) airplanes were built at the Dayton Wright Airplane Company on Springboro Pike in Moraine. The Standard J was a two seat basic trainer two-bay biplane constructed of wood with wire bracing and



fabric covering. Top speed was 75 mph with a ceiling of 6,500 feet. The Jenny Trainer was responsible for training 9 out of 10 American airmen during its tenure.

After World War I many J-ls were flown by civilian flying schools and for joy riding and barnstorming operations until either the plane wore out or were forced into retirement by new 1927 air legislation which banned passenger




aircraft with wood structures due to many high profile accidents.

Airplane safety and construction has come a long way in one hundred years as you can tell by these now hilarious operation of aircraft regulations set forth by the United States Air Service in 1920.

- Don't take the machine into the air unless you are satisfied it will fly.
- Never leave the ground with the motor leaking.
- Do not trust altitude instruments.
- Pilots will not wear spurs while flying.
- Before you begin a landing glide make sure there are no planes under you.
- Pilots should carry hankies in a handy position to wipe off goggles.
- In case the engine fails on takeoff, land straight ahead regardless of obstacles.
- If you see another airplane near you, get out of the way.

Winter Holiday Fire Facts

Christmas trees

- Between 2012-2016, U.S. fire departments responded to an average 170 home fires that started with Christmas trees per year. These fires caused an average of 4 deaths, 15 injuries, and \$12 million in direct property damage annually.
- On average, one of every 45 reported home fires that began with a Christmas tree resulted in a death, compared to an average of one death per 139 total reported home fires.
- Electrical distribution or lighting equipment was involved in 43% of home Christmas tree fires.
- In one-quarter (27%) of the Christmas tree fires and in 80% of the deaths, some type of heat source, such as a candle or equipment, was too close to the tree.
- More than one-fifth (22%) of Christmas tree fires were intentional.
- Forty-two percent of reported home Christmas tree fires occurred in December and 33% were reported in January.
- Two of every five (40%) home Christmas tree fires started in the living room, family room, or den.

 A live Christmas tree burn conducted by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) shows just how quickly a dried out Christmas tree fire burns, with flashover occurring in less than one minute, as compared to a well-watered tree, which burns at a much slower rate.

Holiday decoration

U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated average of 800 home structure fires per year that began with decorations, excluding Christmas trees, in 2012-2016. These fires caused an annual average of two civilian fire deaths, 34 civilian fire injuries and \$11 million in direct property damage.

- Ten percent of decoration fires were intentional.
- The decoration was too close to a heat source such as a candle or equipment in two of every five (42%) fires.
- More than one-fifth (21%) of the decoration fires started in the kitchen. Fifteen percent started in the living room, family room or den.
- One-fifth (19%) of the home decoration fires occurred in December.

Candles

- On average, 23 home candle fires were reported each day between 2012-2016.
- More than half (56%) of the December home decoration fires were started by candles, compared to one-third (31%) in January to November.
- The top three days for home candle fires were Christmas, New Year's Day, and New Year's Eve.

Holiday cooking

- Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires, followed by Christmas Day and Christmas Eve.
- Cooking equipment was involved in 20% of home decoration fires. This can happen when a decoration is left on or too close to a stove or other cooking equipment.

Holiday Decoration Awards

Starting December 1st, nominate your neighbors and friends for the Holiday Decoration Awards. All nominations will be recognized and there will be prizes for the top three homes. Again, this year the Parks and Recreation Board will present the Griswold Award to the home which is most over the top!

Holiday Decoration Judging Criteria:

- Anyone can make a nomination; homeowner may nominate themselves
- Members of the Parks and Recreation Board, City Council and City Staff are ineligible
- Only residential single family homes will be considered
- The Board is looking for simple, yet tastefully decorated homes
- Homes with blow-ups in more than 50% of the yard will not be considered
- The Board is looking for the "Wow" factor



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Holiday Safety Tips

The holiday season is always a special time of year. It is also a time when busy people become careless and vulnerable to theft and other holiday crime. You can never be too careful, too prepared or too aware. Please share this information with family, friends and neighbors.

Driving



- Avoid driving alone or at night.
- Keep all car doors locked and windows closed while in or out of your car. Set your alarm or use an anti-theft device.
- If you must shop at night, park in a well-lighted area.
- Avoid parking next to vans, trucks with camper shells, or cars with tinted windows.
- Park as close as you can to your destination and take notice of where you parked.
- Never leave your car unoccupied with the motor running or with children inside.
- Do not leave packages or valuables on the seat of your car. This creates a temptation for thieves. If you must leave something in the car, lock it in the trunk or put it out of sight.
- Be sure to locate your keys prior to going to your car.
- Keep a secure hold on your purse, handbag and parcels. Do not put them down or on top of the car in order to open the door.
- When approaching or leaving your vehicle, be aware of your surroundings.

- Do not approach your car alone if there are suspicious people in the area.
- Ask mall or store security for an escort before leaving your shopping location.

Automated Teller Machine (ATM)

- If you must use an ATM, choose one that is located inside the mall or well-lighted location. Withdraw only the amount of cash you need.
- Protect your PIN by shielding the ATM keypad from anyone who is standing near you.
- Do not throw your ATM receipt away at the ATM location.

Shopping



- Shop during daylight hours whenever possible. If you must shop at night, go with a friend or family member.
- Dress casually and comfortably.
- Avoid wearing expensive jewelry.
- Do not carry a purse or wallet, if possible.
- Always carry your Driver License or Identification Card along with necessary cash, checks and/or a credit card you expect to use.
- Even though you are rushed and thinking about a thousand things, stay alert to your surroundings.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash.
- Pay for purchases with a check or credit card when possible.
- Keep cash in your front pocket.
- Notify the credit card issuer immediately if your credit card is lost, stolen or misused.
- Keep a record of all of your credit card numbers in a safe place at home.

- Be extra careful if you do carry a wallet or purse. They are the prime targets of criminals in crowded shopping areas.
- Avoid overloading yourself with packages. It is important to have clear visibility and freedom of motion to avoid mishaps.
- Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason. At this time of year, "con-artists" may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings.

Children

- If possible, leave small children at home with a trusted babysitter.
- Teach your child to go to a store clerk and ask for help in case your child is separated from you.
- Teach children to stay close to you at all times while shopping.
- Never allow children to make unaccompanied trips to the restroom.
- Children should never be allowed to go to the car alone and they should never be left alone in the car.
- Teach children their full name, address and telephone number to give to police officers or mall security. Teach children to immediately inform you if a stranger is bothering them.

At Home

- Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave the house, even for a few minutes.
- When leaving home for an extended time, have a neighbor or family member watch your house and pick up your newspapers and mail.
- Indoor and outdoor lights should be on an automatic timer.
- Leave a radio or television on so the house looks and sounds occupied.
- Large displays of holiday gifts should not be visible through the windows and doors of your home.
- When setting up a Christmas tree or other holiday display, make sure doors and passageways are clear inside your home.

- Be sure your Christmas tree is mounted on a sturdy base so children, elderly persons or family pets cannot pull it over on themselves.
- If you use lights on your Christmas tree ensure the wiring is not damaged or frayed. Frayed or damaged wiring can cause a fire.
- Place your Christmas tree in water or wet sand to keep it green.
- Never place wrapping paper in your fireplace.

Strangers at Your Door

- Be aware that criminals sometimes pose as couriers delivering gifts.
- It is not uncommon for criminals to take advantage of the generosity of people during the holiday season by soliciting donations door-todoor for charitable causes although no charity is involved.
- Ask for their identification, and find out how the donated funds will be used. If you are not satisfied, do not donate.
- Donate to a recognized charitable organization.

Hosting a Party

- Have non-alcoholic beverages available for party guests.
- Find alternative transportation for intoxicated guests.
- Arrange for an official designated driver for your party who will not drink at all.

Attending a Party

- Have something to eat before consuming alcoholic beverages.
- Eat high protein foods that will stay in your stomach longer and slow the absorption of alcohol into your system.
- Remember only time will eliminate the alcohol from your body.
- Know your safe limit.
- Never drink and drive.

These days Christmas appears to be more of a retail festival than a religious event, and while it can be a season of joy for many, it is a time of stress or loneliness for others.

If the 'Excess of Christmas" has been getting you down, or if you just want to shake up your usual routine, here are some ideas to help you rewrite the rules, create a new meaning or start a new tradition for doing Christmas Day your way.

Have an "Orphan's Christmas"

If you have neighbours who live alone or don't have family nearby, invite them to Christmas lunch with you? Ask guests to bring a plate of festive food to share and enjoy hearing new stories on Christmas Day.

Take a Paws - Buy Your 2020 Dog License

Once again it's time to purchase dog licenses for 2020!

Residents of Montgomery County may buy licenses between December 2 - January 31 at the Moraine Administration Building, 4200 Dryden Road. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8am - 5pm. A license for a spayed or neutered dog costs \$20, an unaltered dog is \$24. Dogs ages 3 to 9 months are \$20 without regard to spaying/neutering. Ohio law requires all dogs over age 3 months who reside in Montgomery County to be licensed. Cash or checks are accepted. Make checks payable to Montgomery County Dog License. (Sorry, no credit cards.)

License fees support Montgomery County Animal Resource Center operations and licensing a dog is a valuable tool in getting your pet home should they get lost.
