Dog License

Residents of Montgomery County may buy dog licenses between December 1st - January 31st at the Moraine Administration Building, 4200 Dryden Rd. Hours are Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. A license for a spayed or neutered dog costs \$20, an unaltered dog is \$24. Dogs ages 3 to 9 months are \$20 without regard to spaying/neutering. Ohio law requires all dogs over 3 months who reside in Montgomery County to be licensed. The City accepts cash only – exact change. License fees support Montgomery County Animal Resource Center operations and licensing a dog is a valuable tool in getting your pet home should they get lost.

Estimated payments are required if tax liability will exceed \$200.00. Quarterly estimated tax payments are due April 15, June 15, September 15, and January 15 of each year.

A 15% penalty for underpaid/unpaid estimated tax may apply. You can make your fourth quarter estimated payment in the office, by mail, a credit card payment over the phone, or leave in the drop box located in the lobby.

Senior Citizen/ Handicap Driveway Plowing

During the winter season, the Street Division provides driveway plowing services for senior citizens and handicapped residents only when snow accumulation is 2 inches or more. Please note: this is the Street Division's last priority for snowplowing. Requirements for receiving this service are:

- Must be 60 years of age or older.
- Must live alone.
- Exceptions: Handicapped persons who have a verified medical problem may qualify for this service.

Along with meeting all requirements, senior citizens must register in person each year at the Street Division (4720 Vance Road) in order to be eligible for this service. Our list of registrants is updated yearly. Please note: if you do not register yearly, your driveway will not be plowed that particular year. If you have any questions, please contact the Street Division at 937-535-1040.

Snow Removal Guidelines

In order for the Street Division to properly and efficiently plow and clear roadways, cooperation and assistance is needed from residents. Please follow these snow removal guidelines:

- Do not clean your driveway until your street has been plowed and salted. If you choose to clean your driveway prior to plowing and salting of your street, be sure to push the snow to the right of your driveway so when we plow it doesn't block your driveway. If using a snow blower, we ask that you avoid blowing snow back into the street.
- If a snowstorm consists of 2 inches or more, please park all vehicles in your driveway. This will greatly assist the Street Division in properly clearing and plowing all roadways and residential streets. Our goal is to make road conditions as safe as possible for travel throughout the City.

Christmas Tree Disposal

The Street Division will be collecting Christmas trees for disposal after the holidays. If you would like to dispose of your Christmas tree, please place it at the curb for pick-up.

All lights, ornaments, plastic coverings/wraps and metals must be removed from the tree prior to pick up. Items left on trees can injure employees or seriously damage the tree shredding equipment, leaving it inoperable.

Volunteers Needed for Hiking Trail

Volunteers are needed to help complete the Wright Brothers Pinnacles Hiking Trail, a 1.1 mile trail that will run between the Main Street Bike Path and the Pinnacle Road Bike Path. Volunteers would be contacted periodically to help cut overgrown tree branches and growth, help widen the trail and/or help install steps, signs or footbridges.

This trail will pass by the historic spot in 1899 where the Wrights watched the soaring birds fly on the cliff updrafts and came up with their wing design for the eventual airplane. If interested contact Dave Miller at 937-673-0596.

The History of the Great Frisch's Big Boy Fire of 1959 Written by: Dave Miller

Frisch's restaurant – located at the corner of State Route 741 and Dixie Highway – has been a Moraine landmark for the last 67 years. But did you know that the current Frisch's was not the original restaurant in that location?

Prior to Frisch's, Lou's Dude Ranch occupied that location starting in 1945. Lou's was a 15-booth restaurant and bar which offered music played on a Steinway Spinet piano with Solovox. The Country Kitchen chain of restaurants purchased Lou's in 1956 from Louella Fair for \$77,500. After investing \$70,000 in remodeling, they turned it into a Frisch's drive-in restaurant. Sadly, three years later a devastating fire burned down the restaurant and a second Frisch's had to be built. Fortunately, there were no fatalities, but it made front page headlines in the *Journal Herald* on July 3, 1959.

The blaze started when grease caught fire in the kitchen and quickly went up the flue and ignited a nearby gas line. The fire began during dinner rush hour with 70 to 100 patrons being served either inside or outside in their cars, in addition to a long line of customers waiting by the front doors. Nan Pritchard, a waitress on duty who lived nearby on Lauderdale Drive, said she knew there was a fire and thought it was not serious. The dining room, however, rapidly filled up with smoke and the waitresses yelled for everyone to get out quickly.

Miami Township Fire Lt. Emil Emoning who lived nearby, came out of his house, and said that the Frisch's kitchen "looked like a big bomb exploded." When he walked around to the front, he saw that everything was blazing, and the roof caved in 15 minutes later. Although Miami Township firefighters received the call at 6:45 p.m. and had the fire totally contained by 8:30 p.m., their efforts were hampered by about 2,000 people tying up intersection traffic and watching the blaze from a close vantage point. The total loss was estimated at \$250,000.

Moraine resident, Jim Kuhns remembers that day. He was eleven years old back then. Jim and about eight other newspaper delivery boys were seated at a table with their newspaper Branch Manager and had just ordered drinks. They were being treated with a free dinner with awards to follow. A waitress came out and said, "Don't worry about paying, there is a fire in the kitchen so please leave now." During the cleanup, children romped outside the building and one youth snatched bubble gum from a broken gum machine at the charred restaurant's entrance.

Waste Collection & Recycling

The City of Dayton's Division of Waste Collection will once again be providing your waste collection services. Single or double family homes receive waste collection and recycling in Moraine at no charge to the resident.

Please have your bulk waste items, waste container, or recycle container out by 6:30 a.m. on your collection day. Please keep bulk, metal and tires separated (they are picked up by separate trucks and must be scheduled for Bulk Pick-Up). Please DO NOT place any hot items into waste or recycling containers (i.e., ashes from fireplaces). Please wrap, bag, or containerize all trash. DO NOT put loose waste out for collection.



— DO —

- Have your roll-out container or bulk items out by 6:30 a.m. the day of your scheduled waste collection. Remember, you have a collection day, not a collection time.
- Keep bulk and metal items separated (they're picked up by a separate truck).
- Keep yard waste separated from other collection items (it also must be cut and tied in 4-foot lengths no larger than 18 inches in diameter).
- Remove containers from curb line, alley or front yard no later than 8 a.m. on the day after your collection day.
- Place container at least 5 feet away from any object (cars, mailboxes, trees, etc.).
- Always allow 3 feet between containers.
- Place containers at curb (or alley) with handles facing house.

— DON'T –

- · Overfill roll-out (lid should be closed on roll-out).
- Place any hot items in roll-out (ie., ashes from fireplace).
- Place roll-out close to any obstruction (such as an automobile).
- Put loose trash in roll-out (wrap or bag all trash).
- Have trash piled on or around roll-out.

Waste Collection

Waste collection is scheduled every Friday with the exception of weeks containing a holiday. All waste collection services will then be moved to the following day. Residents must purchase their own waste containers with a lid.

Recycling Collection

Recycling is also collected every Friday with trash collection. If you are interested in recycling and would like to obtain a FREE 95-gallon blue City of Dayton recycling container, please call the Call Center at 937-333-4800 and one will be scheduled for delivery. All recyclable material must be loosely placed inside the 95-gallon blue recycle container. Please consult the Recycle Right reference guide for items that are and are not accepted in the recycle container.

Acceptable items for recycling are: glass bottles and jars (all colors); metal cans – aluminum cans, steel cans and lids, empty aerosol cans with the lids and tips removed; plastic bottles (empty, crushed, with caps/lids removed) – bottles and jugs that have a small mouth and wider base, such as milk jugs, soda bottles, laundry detergent bottles, water bottles, shampoo bottles and contact solution bottles; paper – newspaper, magazines, cardboard, mixed office paper and envelopes, paperboard (cereal boxes), pizza boxes free of food debris and grease, telephone books and catalogs; cartons – food and beverage cartons, such as milk, juice, soup, wine, broth and other cartons.

All recycling materials may be mixed together – no separation required. Empty all bottles, jugs and cans (no need to remove labels); for plastic bottles, remove caps/lids; for cartons, remove plastic caps and straws. Never place medical sharps or needles in the recycling. Do not use plastic bags.

Bulk Waste Collection

All bulk waste collections must be scheduled in advance and will be collected every other Friday.

Some large items cannot be thrown away because they are too big to fit in your trash container. Bulk items include, but are not limited to, furniture, carpet, metal appliances, mattresses, refrigerators and stoves. Call 937-333-4800, no later than the Wednesday before your normal collection day, to schedule a bulk waste collection. Set items out by 6:30 a.m. the day of your scheduled bulk collection. If your regular trash is picked up at the curb, place bulk items in front of your home away from obstructions on your specially scheduled collection day. Bundle, bag or containerize all small items. (Keep your neighborhood clean of loose debris.) Roll carpet into a bundle 4 feet long by 2 feet in diameter and tie it with rope. Leave furniture assembled. Tie brush, tree limbs, and carpet into bundles not heavier than 25 pounds, no larger than 4 feet in length, and no bigger than 18 inches in diameter. Yard waste (brush, clippings, tree limbs, etc.) must be tied into bundles not larger than 4 feet long and 18 inches in diameter. Bundles are limited to 25 pounds each. Glass must be taped. Residents are responsible for cleaning up any glass residue that may remain on the ground in front of their home as a result of collection. The City of Dayton cannot collect: sheet rock (drywall), concrete, rocks, bricks, blocks, sand, gravel, paint, construction materials, or hazardous waste. (Examples of hazardous waste are paint, oil, gas containers, etc.)

Bulk pick-ups are limited to (5) five large items and/or up to (25) small bags or boxes.

Items resulting from an eviction, (set or take-out) and move outs, or foreclosure will not be collected. THESE ARE THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE PROPERTY OWNER.

City of Dayton Holidays for Waste and Recycling

Waste and recycling are not collected on holidays. On weeks containing a holiday, waste collection service will be moved back one day following the holiday. For example, if your waste collection day is typically on Monday, but that day is a holiday, your garbage will be collected on Tuesday; Tuesday's normal collection will then move to Wednesday, and so on, through Friday moving to Saturday.

City of Dayton holidays are New Year's Day, MLK Day, Good Friday, Memorial Day, Juneteenth, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Eve and Christmas Day.

2023 Comprehensive Plan

Like any city, Moraine is a product of its history. This is true from its beginnings as part of Van Buren Township in the 1940's and 50's, to its (brief) time as Moraine Township, before the establishment of the Charter and the formation of the City of Moraine in 1965. Our history is written on our street signs, in our parks, and etched in stone at our Municipal Building.

Looking back, it's odd to consider that the past we learn about was, at one point, the future. The newly formed City of Moraine had the ability to decide its own path, and took that responsibility quite seriously. The staff of that era reached out to the Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission an organization still in its own early days, having been founded just a few years prior in 1964.

The result was the first **Comprehensive Development Plan** for the City of Moraine. Approved in 1968, this document served as a roadmap for the City's early growth and development. It was a literal roadmap as well, since it discussed how to improve our roadways to accommodate our residents and businesses alike.

As time passed, additional plans were approved, including the most recent plan in 1995. That plan was written by an outside company, with the support of a committee that featured residents, staff, and members of both the Planning Commission and Council - including four past and future mayors.

Just as has been done in previous decades, it is now time to write the next chapter in the history of Moraine. Staff has been preparing for the new Comprehensive Plan, and will be starting their work in January 2023.

Working with outside consultants, staff will take an in depth look at where the city has been, where we are, and - with your help - where we're going.

How can residents help?

You don't have to be a professional planner or engineer to help us draft the MORAINE, OHIO next Comprehensive Plan. Much

of the plan's contents come directly from feedback we receive from residents and businesses. After all, you are the ones who live and work in Moraine. In many cases, you've lived here all your life. Your vision for the city's future is an important part of how we plan for that future.

Starting in January and February, the City will announce ways for you to make your voice heard. We'll schedule meetings and community forums and other events, open to all residents. We'll be listening to suggestions, messages from our website, and ideas from those meetings. This is your chance to guide the City for the next chapter of its history.

Keep your eyes on our social media, and on the City's website. We'll announce events and opportunities for feedback there. We'll also talk about the new Comprehensive Plan during Council Meetings and other events. The idea is to craft a plan for Moraine that was written by Moraine – and we can't do that without you.
